

# Massachusetts Legislature.

Boston, June 12.

Yesterday in the Senate,

A bill relating to the support of the poor, was passed to be engrossed.

A resolve was passed on the petition of T. Allen, in concurrence.

A resolve was passed on the petition to Hopkins's Academy.

Yesterday in the House,

The Hon. ELIJAH H. MILLS was chosen to the National Senate in concurrence with the election in the State Senate. Mr. Millis had 77 votes—other candidates 44.

Messrs. Slocum, Noble and Taft, were appointed to inquire what public business it is necessary to act upon the present session, and when the Legislature may have a recess.—They reported, as their opinion, that there may be a recess on Friday next. Accepted.

The Committees were enjoined to set forthwith, and report on the several subjects referred to them, as soon as may be.

A bill to incorporate Essex-street Church—a bill to incorporate the Eagle Insurance Company—a bill to annex Z. Gage, &c. to the 3d Congregational Society in Beverly—a bill to change the name of the town of Parsons—a bill to annex M. Fuller, &c. to the West Parish in Medway—the additional bill respecting poor persons imprisoned for debt—and the additional bill respecting inland bills of exchange—were passed to be engrossed.

A bill to establish the First Baptist Society in Washington, was received from the Senate, where it had been passed to be engrossed, was read twice, and this day assigned for the third reading.

A bill to establish the Wilbraham Turnpike, was read twice, and this day assigned for the third reading.

The subject of lesseing the number of Judges, was referred to the next session.

A. Bliss, &c. had leave to bring in a bill, in concurrence.

H. Stearns had leave to withdraw his petition, in concurrence.

A resolve was passed in concurrence, authorizing the President &c. of Bowdoin College, to make any modification of a certain clause in the act relating to the separation of Maine, with the Legislature of that State.

An order of notice was passed in concurrence, on the petition of N. Pease—on that of the Proprietors of Middlesex Canal—and on that of J. B. Ropt.

Reports on petition of the town of Blanford—of Selectmen of Chester—were read.

Petitions of the Merrimack Company for authority to call a legal meeting—Selectmen of Boston, for the co-operation of the Legislature in certain amendments to a street, bounding on the State House Land—of W. Fernald &c. officers, for the repeal of an act passed last session—of C. Herbert, for a sum of money—of H. Ware, to be annexed to Cambridge—of J. Bacon, for the incorporation of a Parish in Natick—of I. Story, &c. for the incorporation of the First Baptist Church in Marblehead—of P. Moody, &c. for the incorporation of a religious society in Waltham were committed—most of them in concurrence.

Remonstrances of C. Tufts, &c.—of a committee of the proprietors of vessels in Braintree and Weymouth—of the town of—Abington, of S. Lazell &c.—of P. Allen, &c.—of J. Newcomb &c.—all against the petition of the Hingham and Quincy Bridge and Turnpike Corporation—were read and committed.

A bill inviting the people to decide on the expediency of calling a Convention, is to be considered this forenoon in the Senate.

The Militia Committee have reported a bill repealing the act of Feb. 24, 1820.

The bill to oblige healthy paupers, between 10 and 65, to support themselves, is before the Court.
