CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Ministers and Messengers of the BOWDOINHAM ASSOCIATION, met at Readstill the Fourth Wednesday in September current; to the respective Churches they represent—grace and peace be multiplied.

DEAR BRETHREN.

THROUGH the tender mercy of our God we have been farored with another precious season of meeting together, to consult the welfare of Zion. With heartselt pleasure and satisfaction we have experienced that wise saying of the Prince of Israel, as Iron sharpeneth Iron, so doth a man the countenance of his friend." When we meet in the great congregation and mingle souls with our brethren from various quarters—when we listen to communications from the Churches, and learn their trials and joys, their decrease and increase, we feel a mixture of pain and pleasure which is indiscribable—Still we find that Zion is increasing. New Churches are received to fellowship, the body of the Churches maintain the doctrines and order of the gospel, while our ears are saluted with agreeable tidings from Sister Associations.

Dear Brethren,—Notwithstanding the jars and commotions in the world, notwithstanding the flood of error that is spreading amongst us, whereby thousands are deluded and fall victims to the shrine of insidelity, let us remember that the Lord God omnipotent reigns, and that his steady purposes are rolling on the wheels of time till ail shall be completely accomplished. at a distance. In addition to this dangerous enemy another more dangerous will succeed and second all the efforts of the world. His artifices are all exposed in the volume of inspiration; to it therefore repair, and take it as the man of your counsel, obey its precious distates, and it shall be a light unto your feet, and a lamp unto your path. But remember, brethren, that the most dangerous enemies are within you, and of all your enemies, these will require the most watchful & vigorous resistance. These sub-ule foes are in wante with all the enemies without, and when a communication between them is effected, dangerous consequences ensue. Mortify, therefore, your members which are on the earth—crucify the old man with his sults and affections, and put on the new man which after God is created in knowledge, righteousness and holiness.

To conclude, we recommend to you a diligent and close attention to the gospel, as a rule of conduct, whether it respects our duty to God, to ourselves, or to our fellow men. Often measuring ourselves by this rule, we shall discover our impersections and Thort comings, and be led to adopt the language of the inspired psalmits, "My goodness extendeth not unto thee, but to the Saints, the excellent of the earth, in whom

is all my delight."
