MINUTES

OF THE

CHARLESTON ASSOCIATION.

High Hills of Santee, October the 24th, 1785.

1st. A T eleven o'clock, A.M. Reverend Silas Mercer delivered a discourse from Rev. 15: 2: after which the Delegates convened, when letters from eight Churches were read, and the names of the Messengers enrolled.

2d. Rev. Fvan Fugh was chosen Moderator, and Mr. Peter Brainbridge, Clerk.

3d. Received two letters from our Sifter Affociation of Philadelphia, one of the year 1782, the other of 1734, with copies of their minutes; which were read, and gave great latisfaction.

4th. A letter and copy of minutes were received from an Association lately formed in Georgia, which were brought by the Reverend Messrs. Silas Mercer and Peter Smith, their Messengers to us, who were cordially received as such.

51b. The Reverend Messire. Evan Pugh, Edmund Botsford, Richard Furman, and Joshua Palmer, or any two of them, were appointed our Messengers to our Sister Association in Georgia; and Mr. Arch bald M'Bride to prepare a exter-

6th. Reverend Richard Furman appointed to prepare a letter to our Sister As-

sofation of Philadelphia, and Reverend Evan Pugh the circular letter.

7th. It appearing, upon enquiry, that the Ministers appointed at the last meeting of Association to visit the Bethel Church, had not executed the business of their appointment; and Reverend Evan Pugh (as one of them) requesting that other persons might be chosen for that purpose; our Brethren, Richard Furman, William M'Conies and William Hampton, were appointed accordingly.

8th. A covenant relating to the incorporating of this Affociation, was prefented by Reverend Richard Furman, which being read, and the contents duly considered, was appread; but the carrying it into execution was referred till

the next Meeting of Atiociation.

9th. A letter from a Church at Stephen's Creek, requesting admission into this Association, was read. Upon a satisfactory account of their faith and practice, resolved, we are willing to receive them into union with us, when they shall appear by their Messengers.

10th. Queries from the Charleston Church.—1st. How is a Church to confider a Member who has withdrawn from it without the Church's confint?

Answer: It is evident such a conduct is diforderly; vet we advise that circumflances be considered, and the person dealt with in the spirit of love, as the Gospel

directs.

2d. In what manner ought the Church to proceed with a Member who joins the private meetings of the Methodials; yet still professes to be in sellowship with us?

Answer: If it be understood, that to join such society is becoming a Member of the Methodult Church, such a condust is certainly dishaloshed but if it be only to join in social exercises of devotion, on principles of liberality, without absenting sion the worship of the Church to which there exists belongs, it may suffice to caution such an one against embracing any thing contrary to the pure doctrine of the Gospel.

11th. Queries from the Church at Jeffer's Creek: 1/2. How is a member to be received into a church, who is a member of a Sifter Church, which is much

dispersed, and does not uphold discipline?

Answer: We advise that a strict enquire be made, if a sew members may not be collected and a letter obtained; but if this cannot be done, the person should be received by a declaration of his faith an 1 practice.

2d. Is it confident with duty, for a person who holds eternal election, and the final perseverance of the Saints to practice hearing such preachers as deny shose

doctrines?

Anywer. We confider those doctrines to be true and important principles of the christian faith, and apprehend, thought it may not be inconfident with duty, in some cases, for members of our churches to hear preachers who deny them yet they ought to be very cautious lest they give up those truths, he leave room for others to supect their indifferency to the in.

12th. The church in Charleston requesting supplies: Agreed, that the following supplies be afforded them: Reverend Richard Forman, in December; Reverend Joshua Palmer, in February; Reverend Edmund Bosshad in March;

Reverend Evan Pugh, in May; and Reverend Joseph Cook, in July.

13th. Reverend Messis. Edmund Botsford, Evan Pugh, Joseph Cook, Joseph Lewis, and Richard Furman, were appointed on the standing Committee of As-

fociation to continue till the rext meeting.
