

## MINUTES, &C.



### SATURDAY, MAY 2d, 1801.

LDER James Shelborne, sen. preached the introductory fermon, from Hebrews XII. And let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith.

After divine service, proceeded to read the letters, to see who composed the association.

vited to feats.

Brethren James Saunders, George Smith, James Shelborne, sen. and Abner Watkins, chosen to write the circular letter.

Brethren John Gary and William Sydnor, chosen to receive the church's bounty, and make any necessary appro-

priations.

Brethren chosen to preach on the Lord's Day, are Abner Watkins, George Smith, and Benjamin Watkins; worship to begin at 11 o'clock, A. M. Then adjourned to Monday morning 9 o'clock.

The Lord's Day was spent in public worship, a large audience attended the ministry of the word, and we hope there were evidences of the Lord's special favor.

### Monday Morning, May 4th, 1801.

Met pursuant to adjournment, and after divine service

proceeded to business.

Received Minutes from the following affociations, Flat River, Nucle, Kehukee, Portsmouth and Dover, sent to us by brother William Brame, for which we kindly thank him, and the above associations.

We the committee appointed to arrange the function, the affociation, do make the following report, viz:

1. A report to be made by the committee enotes to visit

Nottoway church.

2. A report to be made by the committee chosen to write the circular letter.

3. A report to be made by the committee chosen to receive the church's bounty, and make any necessary appropriations.

4. That examination be made from the respective churches, with regard to sending messengers to the general meeting

of correspondence.

6. The time and place of the next affectation to be fixed on.
The committee chosen to visit Notionay church, not having complied with the same, for satisfactory reasons of fered; it is agreed that the appointment still be continued, and make report to our next association.

The committee chosen to write the circular letter reported, and being read, was received without any amendment,

and fo were discharged.

The committee appointed to receive the bounty, and make any necessary appropriations, reported, that they had received from the several churches the sum of £ 5:10

To allowing the clerk for transcribing the Minutes, and superintending the printing, &c.

The above report being received, the committee was

discharged.

Brethren George Smith, Abner Watkins, James Shelborne, sen. Moderator, the Clerk and his assistant, appointed a committee to examine the churchs letters respecting the general meeting of correspondence, who having withdrawn for a while, returned, & reported, & were discharged.

This affociation does not accede to the eliablishing of a general meeting of correspondence, it being contrary to the

Mective voices of their churches: yet to obviate any grievance that may arife, they have chosen the following breathren: James Saunders, George Smith, Rane Chastain, and Benjamin Watkins, to meet them at Dupuy's meeting-house, in Powhatan county, the 3d Saturday of this present month, May, 1801.

With regard to the query from Chestersield church: Agreed, that we draw up an address as an answer to the query, and that it be directed or sent to the Chestersield church, attested by the moderator and clerk. The committee chosen, are Junes Saunders, James Shelborne, George Smith, Abner Watkins, Bernard Todd, the Moderator and Clerk, who having withdrawn for a while, returned, and reported, which was received, and the committee discharged.

Agreed, that the next association be holden at Cedar-Creek Meeting-House, Luneaburg county, the second Sa-

turday in October next.

Agreed, that the Minutes be printed under the same direction of last year, and that the clerk distribute them to the several churches at discretion. Dismissed, after divine service.

## CIRCULAR LETTER.

AFFECTIONATE BRETHREN,

HROUGH the goodness of our God, we have been indulged with another of our especiations. We received and read letters from sixteen churches; some are complaining of a great declension of religion, while others have been visited with a happy revival.

We have been favored several days with the public worship of God, and trust that we have had his royal presence amongst us, and are encouraged to believe that such meet ings tend for his glory and the good of the churches in general: We would therefore erjoin it on you to forsake it not.

Parmit us brethren to ca'l your attention, by holding fast the profession of our faith. We live at a time when insidely and vice abounds, and the love of many wax cold: Let these considerations cause us to held fast our holy religion, and to stand unshaken in the ploticus destrines of grace, to eye our great Redeemer, and to live in uniform obedience to all his precepts. Remember we have professed his name before many witnesses; we are numbered amongst the family of Christ, and have espoused his cause. May we remember the eyes of the Lord, angels and men are looking on us continually;—let these things excite us to watch unto prayer, both in public and private, and to make ourselves well acquainted with the word of God, by often perusing the same.

Dear brethren, let us not be discouraged, for the Lord reigneth, and the government is upon his shoulders: He is riding forth in various parts of the earth, conquering the hearts of numbers, causing them to fall like Lagon before the ark of the Lord. Let us then be engaged, for the work is the Lord's, and his cause is glorious. And when the chief shepherd shall appear, ye shall receive a crown of glary that sadeth not away."
