MINUTES, &c.

A T an association holden at Tussekiah Meeting-House, in Lunenburg county, the second Saturday in October 1802.

John Robertson preached the introductory fermon, from Galatians vi. and 7.8.

After divine service, read the letters sent to see who composed the association.

After reading the letters, choice Rane Chai-

tain, moderator, who chose Benjamin Wat-

kins, clerk, and Bernard Todd, assistant.

On motion, the following brethren invited to feats: James Hurt. Edmond Johns, Jordan Martin, Richard Poindexter, John Baldwin, William Fears, James Shelborne, jun. Thomas Wood and John Robertson.

Brethren James Saunders, James Shelborne, sen. the moderator, clerk, and his assistant, chosen to arrange the business of the association, and to make report on Mon-

day morning.

Brethren Abner Watkins, Joel Johns, John Scurry and Richard Poindexter, chofen to write the circular letter, and report on Monday morning.

Agreed, that John Bass and Littleberry Patteson receive the churches bounty, and settle with the treasurer, and make report.

On motion, the following brethren chofen to preach on the Lord's day, Rane Chaftain, James Hurt & James Saunders, worship to begin at 11 o'clock, A. M.

After worship, adjourned to Monday

morning 9 o'clock.

The Lord's Day was front in public worship, a large audience attended the ministry of the word, and we trust there were evidences of the Lord's presence.

Monday Morning, October 11, 1802. Met pursuant to adjournment, and after divine service, proceeded to business. The committee chosen to arrange the bufiness of the association, do make the following report, viz.

1. The members chosen to attend the general meeting of correspondence, to report.

"Is it right or is it not, for an arm of a church to be established between two constituted churches, which are not above 12 or 13 miles apart?"

3. A letter received from Chestersield church to be considered.

4. The committee chosen to write the circular letter, to report.

5. Commissioners appointed to receive the churches bounty, and settle with the treasurer, to report.

6. The time and place of the next affociation. The report being received, the committee were discharged.

James Saunders and Rane Chastain (two of the brethren chosen to attend the gencal meeting at Muddy creek meeting-house in May Iast) offered their reasons why they did not attend the said meeting, which were considered as sufficient. Benjamin Watkins, another of the brethren appointed to attend the said meeting, attended thereon, and reported the proceedings of said meet-

ing which report was confidered as not fa-

tisfactory: We however de not disapprove of our messengers conduct, altho' he voted contrary to the sense of this association, because he was not at the association, which appointed him, and therefore had never

received the necessary instructions.

The query from Mountain Creek church taken up, and answered thus; "Agreed, That we send them a committee in order to give a full solution to the above said querry, who are, Rane Chastain, James Shelborne sen. James Saunders, and William Ellis, and to make report to our next association."

A letter from Chestersield church, anfwered in the following manner: "Agreed that we refer the same until such time as we can have an interview with said church by her messengers."

The committee appointed to prepare the circular letter, reported, and was received,

and fo discharged.

Commissioners chosen to receive the bounty and settle with the treasurer, reported, that they find in the hands of the treasurer, after the necessary appropriations, for the last year.

The above report was received, and the brethren discharged.

Agreed, that 250 copies of our minutes be printed under the same direction as the last session.

Agreed, that our clerk fend copies of our minutes to the different corresponding affociations.

After divine service, were dismissed.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

Dearly Beloved Brethren,

WE have the happiness to inform you that pursuant to our appointment, and under the protection of Divine Providence, once more we have met in association, wherein we have been much comforted, hoping and believing, that the unity of the spirit hath prevailed amongst us. Having also received nineteen letters of communication, some of which bring us glad tidings of good things, to wit: the blessed work of the Lord Redeemer, in a glorious manner, proving efficacious in cal-

ling many from darkness to light, as well as lively hopes of its continuation—To which end, may we join our hearty prayers, that God in his tender mercies, would make it more general, that sovereign grace may be extended to the subversion of wickedness and downfall of insidelity.—We wish also brethren, to impress upon your minds the importance of a lively exercise, in our various thristian duties, which we conceive to be of great importance to evidence the sincerity of our hearts before Almighty God, as also in the view of a carnal and unbelieving world.

Ist. That of love and unity, you are sensible dear brethren, that the blessed Jesus laid it down as the common trait in the Christian character, by which they are distinguished from the world, viz. "Love to one another," to which St. J. subjoins his invincible testimony. It is not sufficient to do it indeed and in truth.

2dly.
