CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Elders and Messengers of the New-Hampsbire Associations to the Churches whom they represent, send Christian Salutation:

BELOVED BRETHREN,

A S the great head of the Church has favoured us with another anniversary meeting, and granted us some of the sweet clusters of the heavenly vine, we feel under renewed obligation to address you by letter, according to our usual practice. We adopt the words of the inspired penman, viz. "Our heart's desire and prayer to-God for Ifrael, is, that they might be faved." Doubtlefs many have a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge. Such is the condition of fallen men, and to depraved is the human heart, that a false zeal, (which is head-strong and fierce, and breathes out a revengeful spirit against our Divine Lord, his purposes, designs and eternal truths,) is received by many, for true religion, and highly applauded by many of the unregenerate. While on the other hand, true zeal is that pure and heavenly flame, which is mild and merciful, supplied by the fire of Divine Love, and governed by the word and spirit of God. We exhort you, dear brethren, (as there are many false prophets gone out into the world) to believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God, by the standard of Divine Truth.

Faithfulness not only affords inward peace and rest, but is ornamental to the Christian Religion, and will ever meet the approbation of our Lord, and every serious well disposed mind. We ask your attention, to a few restections on Revelation 2 chap. 10 v. "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life." To be of the class thus addressed, we must have that faith which works by love; we mean the faith of Gol's elect which is his free gift. And to be faithful in the sense of the text, is to believe on Jesus unto death, to exercise our faith constantly on him as our dear. Saviour, whose blood has atoned.

for our fins; whose righteousnels justifies our perfons, and has perfectly reconciled us to God, and ever lives to love, pray for, and fave us to the uttermost; steadily to believe his word of truth, and the doctrine which is according to Godliness, and sincerely obey the precepts which adorn his Gospel; and to live upon him as our only title to glory; thus faithfully to confess him our all in all, and ourselves nothing in the great work of To be faithful unto death is to renounce our own righteousness and faithfulness, and consider them as filthy rags in point of justification before God. It will be expected that the followers of the Lamb, will have a respect to a'l his commands, will live soberly, righteously, and Godly in this present evil world, will be watchful and prayerful, and will give evidence unto those that are without, that they not only have been with Jesus, but that it is their meat and drink to do the will of their Heavenly Father. Dear Brethren, if we are found faithful in our feveral callings, unto our Divine master, to our brethren and fellow men, we may expect tribulation and perfecution; but it will be short. Sorrow may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning. While the disobedient are filled with a fearful looking for of judgment & fiery indignation, which shall devour the adversaries; the faithful in Christ Jesus may be looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God, and our Saviour, Jefus Christ, with the brilliant crown of eternal life.

The special tokens of Divine favor, which have been experienced by many the year past, within the circle of our acquaintance, consirm the truth of God's word, that "there is a reward for the righteous." Though the vision tarry, wait; he that shall come, will come, and will not tarry. The days of mourning will soon be ended. Jesu will lead you through the cold stream of Jordan, and land you safe within the gates of the celestial city, to join the countless throng in songs of unceasing praise to him who sitteth upon the throne, and to the Lamb sorever and ever. The New-Hampsbire Association convened at Waterborough, County of York, June 13 and 14, 1810, to the Elders and Brethren of our beloved sister associations, GREETING.

DEARLY BELOVED IN THE LORD,

GOD has favoured us with another opportunity of meeting here on earth to transact business relative to the kingdom of our dear Redeemer; and we hope, we really confider that God is greatly to be feared in the affembly of his faints, and to be had in reverence of all that are about him Poor worms that we are! How incapable of such a service without the immediate affistance of God! and if so, how little reason have we to be proud of our best performances! There is not a just man upon earth that doth good and finneth not. How then doth grave make irs own way to our hearts, to do us good, though evil bepresent with us? Yet we delight in the law of God, af er the inward man, and find that expression of our Lord as truth, "without me ye can do nothing." Still it remains a question with some, whether some act of regenerate souls may not be free from fin? But experience teaches us, my brethren, that evil is present with us in all we do, let usthen plead the righteousness of Jesus Christ for acceptance with God, and hold fast our profession, for we have not an high priest who cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities, but was in all points rempted like as we are, yet without fin.
