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In answer to request of the Church at Brentwood, we can only say, that if they wish to be dismissed from their connection with us, as an Association, we have no objection, but we view it not consistent to consider or to correspond with them, as an association so long as they view themselves but one Church; for we view an association to be a combination of Churches.

Voted to accept the report of the Committee.

Chose Eider Henry Smith, Treasurer.

5. The circular letter prepared by Elder Goding, and the Corresponding Letter prepared by Elder Hodgdon, were read and accepted.

6. Pecsived accounts from corresponding Associations as follows: from Warren, minutes by Elder Samuel Abbot. From Bowdeinham, minutes by Elder James Hooper. From

Meredith, minutes by Gustavus Sumner, received minutes from Woodstock. Received minutes from Lincoln, by Etder Hanes.

7. Appointed the following Brethren to corresponding Associations, Edgers Took, Sherburne, and Webber, to Warren; Powers, Smith, Goding and Delano, to Bodoinham; Robinson and Morrisson, to Woodstock; Robinson, Chase, and Brother Goodwin, to Meredith. Chose Smith, Roberts, and Holdon, to Lincoln.

8. Voted, that Eider Roberts, prepare the Circular Letter, and Elder Sherburne, the corresponding letter, for next year.

9. Voted, to recommend it to the churches of this Association, to have a contribution, in the month of July, for our Brethren at Newburyport, to be sent to our Treasurer, Henry Smith, and forwarded by him to the Brethren.

10. Voted, to recommend it to the churches of this Assoeiation, to send to the clerk the time when their churches were constituted, and the number of members when they were constituted, to be inserted in brother Benedict's History.

Circular Letter.

The Elders and Messengers of the New-Hampshire Association to the Churches whom they represent,

BELOVED IN THE LORD CALLED TO BE SAINTS ;

UKE. TING .--

E declare unto Brethren by the word of God that we who now address you are under obligation to contend earnestly for the faith once delivered to the Saints; we therefore ask your attention to a few reflections on this important subject: And first, the Saints believed that Gon is the Almighty Gon; holy, holy, holy and unchangeable, the great, the just and merciful Goo. Secondly, they believed that by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin, and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned. But many strong prejudices have arisen in men's minds against such important truths. Our nature and pride is hardly brought to stoop to such a humbling and abasing consideration. But whatever opposition this may meet with from men of corrupt minds, the whole tengur of the Bible every where considers, directs and treats us as fallen sinful creatures. And David saith, behold I was shaken in iniquity and in sin, did my mother conceive me; thus all have sinned and all have gone out of the way. No words can be used more fully to express. the universality of the pollution of original sin Sin has not only entered into the world, but all, without exception, have sinned; which leads us to observe, thirdly, that the rightcousne's of Jesus Christ is necessary unto salvation, for by it we are justified and saved from the wrath to come. Therefore as by the offence of one, judgment came upon all men to condemation, even so by the righteousness of one, the free gift came upon all men unto justification of life. Now beloved Brethren if the scope and design of the Apostles reasoning be considered, it will be found, that He is there comparing Adam with Christ and running the parallel between them as they were both public persons and representatives of their posterity. He also shews us that all Adam's natural posterity whomhe represented were without exception, chargeable with sin and guilt and in a state of condemnation; even so all Christ's spiritual seed whom he represented, are all, without exception, partakers of his righteousness unto justification of life. Therefore, being justified by faith, we have peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, who was delivered for our

offences and was raised again for our justification.

Jesus how glorious is thy grace when in thy name we trust our faith receives a righteousness that makes the sinner just. Finally Brethren, the sum of the matter is, all our hope of pardon is from the merit of the Cross and obedience of Christ. All our hope of Salvation is from Christ's having fulfilled all righteousness for us; and it is through faith that we have an evidence of his love. We beseech you therefore Brethren by the mercies of God that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holyacceptable unto God which is your reasonable service. We further add that if we are to have our dependence upon what Christ has done and suffered for us we are taught that we must depend upon him in the way of carefulness to maintain good works. (Titus 3, 8.) and we cannot safely trust in or depend upon him in any other way, all other dependences exclusive of this care of exemplary living is not faith but presumption for faith without works is dead. So then they that have faith unfeigned dwelling in them will endeavourto live Godly in Christ Jesus. Thus the faith of God's Elect is a justifying faith as well as is a sanctifying and purifying faith unto the praise of Gon.

Corresponding Letter.

The New-Hampshire Association convened at Wells, June 12th & 13th, 1811. To Corresponding Associations sendeth Christian Salutation.

BELOVED BRETHREN.

THROUGH divine goodness we have had another Anniversary interview, and recognizing the particular benefits resulting from our mutual intercourse, shall we address you upon the fellowship of the gospel. lowship with the father and with his son Jesus Christ, is indispensably necessary to Fellowship with the saints; this is essential to the Christian Character, and without it there can be no true religion: There is no friendship so pure, strong and lasting as that, which is formed in the Gospel; the constitution being holy, the objects are worthy of rational and i.nmortal beings. It is inclosed being first, formed between Christ and the soul, and in him, united to his disciples; they are all one in him; with this agree the words of our Lord, "Holy Father keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given; me, that they may be one, as we are; again, there is one body and one spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one Faith, one Baptism, one God and father of all, who is above all, and thro' all, and in you all. Conformity of Character is essential to permanent triendship, and unanimity to Christian Fellowship: "Can two walk together except they be agreed," If we walk in the Truth as it is in Jesus, we shall all undoubtedly be of one mind and of one Judgment, speaking the same thing, and have Fellowship one with another; and truly our Fellowship will be with the Father and the Son Jesus Christ, by whom we have received the spirit of Adoption, and are constituted Fellow-Chizens: with the Saints and of the household of God. The degree of fellowship which we have one with another will ever correspond with that, which, we have with the great head of the Church. While we keep the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace our efforts may be conducive to the advancement of the Redeemers Kingdom, and we may leave to posterity memorials of our wisdom, Industry and perseverence. Although we should be assiduous to improve our fellowship; yet we should be careful, not to extend it beyond the limits divinely prescribed; Our charily should be universal; but our fellowship should be particular. The documents of our holy religion remonstrate against discord among brethren, and incite to amity; and our fellowship with any, who, do not conform to the christian directory is divinely interdicted. Although a person under the habitual influence of saving faith, may imbibe error, yet there is no connection between truth and error, faith is the belief of the truth, and on this it terminates

Let us then seek for the things that make for peace and whereby one may edify another. We have been much gratified in receiving your messengers and minutes, and renew our

solicitations for a centuru the of your correspondence.

Pray for us, that we may stand perfect and complete in all the win of God. Our present meeting has been solemn and agreeable, and we trust, crowned with success. That brotherly ove may continue and our followship be finally completed in the society of blessed spinus, are the earnest prayers of yours in the best bonds.
