WEDNESDAY, JUNE 12, 1816.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Elders and Messengers of the New-Hampshire Association, to the Churches they represent.

DEAR BRETHREN,

AMONG the subjects on which we address you, none are perhaps, of more importance at this time than that contained in the words of our Lord Jesus, Luke XII. 15. Take heed, and beware of covetousness; for a man's life consisteth not in the abundence of the things which he possesseth. This is a sin that easily besets every man; and for which more excuses are plead than for any other. It often walks in disguise, as Paul shows the Thessalonians in speaking of a cloak of covetousness. It frequently goes under the mask of prudence, hence the Apostle's language is by many perverted in the following text. "But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." Against this sin Cod both shows his limberage in around any

sin God hath shown his displeasure in every age.

The indignation and fury of the Lord against Jerusalem is shown us by the prophet, Jere. 6. 11, 12, 13, here we discover the judgments of God upon children, youth, husband and wife; the hand of the Lord was stretched out against the inhabitants of the land; for from the least of them even unto greatest of them, every one was given to covetousness; and from the prophet even unto the priest, every one dealt falsely. Ministers are often infected with it, and regard the fleecemore than the flock; People are infected with it and are reproved by the prophet Mal. 3. 8, 9. Will a man rob God? yet ye have robbed me: but ye say, wherein have we robbed thee? In tiths and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me even this whole nation. Through the covetousness of the people, the Levites, the Priests of the Lord received not the portion that the Lord had appointed them; they had to leave God's altar, and go into the fields to obtain the necessaries of life. For the iniquity of covetousness the Lord was wrath with the Jews and smote them, yea, hid himself and was wrath. Isa. 57. 17. The case of Gehazi, is to our purpose; when the prophet refused a gift from Naaman the Syrian, Gehazi, through covetousness followed him with a lie in his mouth, and obtained two talents of silver, and two changes of garments; and having secreted them, returned to his master, who inquired where he had been; he replied, "thy servant went no whether." But Elisha detected his covetousness and falshood, and inquired whether it was a time to receive money, and garments, and olive yards, and vineyards, He then denounced the judgments of God against him and his "The leprosy of Naaman shall cleave unto thee, and unto thy seed forever. And he went out from his presence a leper as white as snow." The covetousness of Achan who troubled Israel, brought dis. truction on himself and whole family. The wrath of God was displayed in the death of Ananias and Sapphira for their covetousness, pride, and falsehood; they deliberately agreed to all this wickedness; they lied against the Holy Ghost. Ahab king of Israel with all his possessions, could not be contented, he yet coveted Naboth's vineyard. Naboth virtuously declined parting with the inheritance of his fathers: But the detestable Jezabel, contrived and effected the death of Naboth, and Ahab took possession of the vinyard; but did not long enjoy it. God's wrath fell on the whole household of Ahab, to death and distruction.

Judas, could sell his divine master, even to be crucified, for thirty pieces of silver: But his end, his dreadful end should be a warning to us and all others to be ware of covetousness. Finally covetousness is ranked among the most atrocious crimes, and excludes the soul from the kingdom of Heaven. Therefore brethren agreeably to our Lord's words let us take heed, and be ware of covetousness. But to do good and to communicate forget not, for with such sacrifices God is well pleased. Cast thy bread upon the waters; for thou shalt find it after many days. There is that scattereth, and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet; but it tendeth to poverty. Therefore having these warnings against covetousness, let us practice beneficence. Godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is and of that which is to come. Truth is a girdle, let us wear it—Charity never faileth; let us follow after it— Honesty is the best policy—God delighteth in a just weight and a just balence—let us use no other.

And while our brethren in so many different places are contributing of their abundance, for the spread of the gospel, in different lands; let us also cast in our mite; this is the only world in which we can de good to our fellow men; and it will soon be said to us give up thy steward ship, for thou mayest no longer be steward. Let us then as wise stewards improve our time and talents, so that our Lord may have to say unto us, well done good and faithful servants, enter into the joy of your Load.
