CIRCULAR LETTER.

BRETHREN,

In our last circular letter, we addressed you on the true original of the scriptures, which we consider as a book clothed with distinct authority. Happy would it be for mankind did they generally ly receive it as such. But sad experience affords daily conviction, that the human heart hardened by sin bids desiance to all persuasion and cannot be industreed, even by the strongest motives unless unged home by all argisty power. Judging upon a rational scale one would conclude that some must inevitably perish in their ins.

But the almighty Jehovah he hown his grace to be equal with his power, he fends abroad his good spirit, to the agency of which helpless sinners are wholly indebted for the application of all spiritual and eternal blessings. This subject, as it is of great importance, and demands attention, shall be the theme of this letter.

The agency of the spirit of God, is that operation of divine power of which either renews the same in the image of God, or afterwards produces in him divine conformity to that image. It is the effectual operations of Gods spirit of which we intend to treat, is distinction from that operation which attended Saul among the prophets, or Judas among the apostles. We speak of that powerful operation which renews the heart of the dead sinner, translates him out of the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of God's dear Son, are carries on the work begun by this change until it be consummated in glory.

is not only rationally convinced that he is a finner, but he is the roughly roused up to a sense of his condition. His awakened his convinced, his affrighted soul begins to realize his exposed ness to the just displeasure of God. He seels himself tottering the precipice, the awful precipice of remediless destruction unterconciled to justice, he strives to escape it in vain; and is at length brought night to the borders of despair. In this critical moments grace interposes, and he is snatched as a brand from the burning the stony heart is taken away and a heart of siesh is given, the captive soul is released, and a new song is put into his mouth, a new language shows from his lips, a new conduct appears in his life, in a word all things are become new.

The agency of God's spirit carries on the solvation of the sunce from regeneration to glory, it is all of God; but the renewing influences, and sanctifying influences are capable of a distinction; the former implant a principle of life, the latter invigorate the principle implanted. In the sufficient makes no use of the faculties of the soul, in the last the rational faculties are used & necome subservient

the work. The subject of the sanctifying operations of the spirit has every faculty of soul rendered attentive to the things of God. He with open sace beholds as in a glass the glory of the Lord and is changed into the same image from glory to glory, by the spirit of the Lord.—By these transforming discoveries progressive conformity to God is carried on in his soul. Whilst he sees in the glass of God's word the KEDEEMER's beauty, and his own frightful desormity, he abhors the one and loves the other. The longs to be delivered from sin, he pants after God, the living God. He frequently seeds the infessionly of sin, and bemoans his vileness; the sinjoyment of God and that only can make him happy, and as sin hinders this enjoyment, he slies from it as from an enemy of God, a disturber of his peace, unreasonable in nature and dreadful in its effects.

In short the spirit in its sanctifying agency on the human heart sews the creature the awful contrast between him & his od, thospughly explores the heart, & brings into view all its latent abominations, discovers such vileness & pollution that the creature is unly mortified, & with Job abhors himself & repents in dust and of bes.

Thus the wholework of fanctification is carried on by clear and affecting conviction of the beauty of holiness and deformity of whilst the holy-ghost hovering over the soul creates in it, that there after the one, and aversion from the other, which leads a to cleanse himself from all silthiness of siesh and spirit, persecting holiness in the sear of the Lord.

The agency of the spirit of God in its sanctifying influences is rasional. It brings information to the understanding, inclination to the will, authority to the conscience, and true peace to the whole fel, Rational, because it influences to nothing unreasonable, no thravagance, fanaticism, madness nor folly but to sobermindedness and humility.—Information to the understanding. It does not tive on by blind impulse, or fatal necessity, for it discovers in the silest light the nature of duty, the ground of obligation, and the medonableness of immediate compliance with it. Inclination to the It produces a pliability of foul to divine authority, and leads cry out with eagerness, Lord what wouldest thou have me to do ?-Authority to the conscience. The word of God is brought home to the foul in all its majesty from which conscience receives a peculiar sensibility, and with which it joins its voice in commanding into subjection every thought to the obedience of Christ.—True prace to the foul. It brings the foul into unconditional subject tion to God, quells disorders, harmonizes the faculties, promotes faith in promises, and an unshaken dependance on the mercy of God through Jesus Christ.

From what has been said, the agency of Gods spirit appears to

be of infinite importance in the christian system, a missian force respecting it is attended with great danger. When we consider man as a fallen creature, unwilling to see the worst of himselfs, or his situation, and too apt to presume that things are better than they really are, we mast conclude that however great the danger may be, human nature is exposed to it. Such is the small ty and depravity of our nature, we are liable to mistake imagination for inspiration, a love of happiness, for the love of God, and partial zealous bigotry, for love to the general cause and kingdom of Christ. Sensations merely animal, or selfsish, we have great reason to sear, are too often taken for, and gloried in, as immediate fruits of divine agency.

But beloved breihren, let us not be deceived; charity, true charity, vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth not behave itself unseemly. Real divine influence produces, in the hu man heart difinterested love to God and man, brings the sinner to the foot of lovereign mercy, and attaches him to the word of God as an infallible rule of duty: and by this he examines himself and all his exercises. Beloved believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God. Thus we are exhorted by the beloved disciple. But how shall we try the spirit? Shall we measure ourselves by ourselves, and compare ourselves among our selves? God sorbid!-But let us measure ourselves by the Bibles Let us compare the voice of God in his word to the voice of God in our hearts, if they are alike we are fafe, but if they differ we are in delution, we are in love with a lie, compatting ourselves about with sparks of our own kindling, and shall lie down in form But brethren be exhorted to watch unto prayer, love your religion Seek direction from God-Have recourse to his word on ever occasion-Let circumspection mark all your steps, and moderain your proceedings. Let these memorable words of Christ be graven on your hearts Without ME, i. e. the agency of an spirit, we can do nothing. If any man lack wisdom, or the teaching of the spirit, let him ask of God, who giveth to all me liberally and upbraideth not, and it shall be given him.

Finally brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are pure whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report if there be any virtue, if there be any praise think on these things And the peace of God which passeth all understanding shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus Amen.
