WEDNESDAY, June 2, 1802.

T 10 o'clock, A. M. Elder Elias Lee, according to appointment, preached the Introductory Sermon, from 1. John 8: For this cause was the Son of God manifested, that he might not the works of the Devil.

Voted to send Ministers to the Philadelphia.

o. Brother Gray's Corresponding Letter was read, and referred to a committee, confishing of Brethren Blood, Webb and Olmsted, for inspection. The Circular Letter having failed, Brother Co. well was appointed to prepare one and present it to-morrow.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The ELDERS and BRETHREN, met in Association at F. Nown, June 2d and 3d, 1802: To the Churches which they represent, fend Greeting.

BELOVED BRETHREN.

Nour last year's minutes, we recommended to you a proposition for raising money by annual contribution, for the support of the gospel in destitute parts of the wilderness: and whereas some of the churches have manifested their approbation, and sent sorward their liberality, while others seem in suspence and call for surther information as to the design of such contribution, and the rules by which it is to be conducted: we, therefore, think it and duty, at this time, to give you a particular statement of the align of said contribution, and the rules by which the applicata of it is to be regulated. And,

Aft. The design of the proposition is to place things in such a station as to enable the Association to send able and faithful Maissers to preach the Gospel, and endeavour to build up the states of the Canadas, as are destitute of gospel privileges; and, as they can have access, among the nations of the wilderness.

The defign is to prevent, as far as possible, the prevalence imposture in those parts of the world; and, for the better achilding these purposes, the business is to be regulated by sollowing

Breihren) shall be annually chosen, so long as the Associa-

tion fivil judge it expedient to fend out Missionaries; which confittee shall have a Chairman, Clerk and Treasurer, of the number, who shall be chosen at their first meeting after their election. A majority of said committee shall be a quorum to transact business.

ad. The duty of the committee shall be-first, To take charge of the contributions made by the Churches for the assistance of Missionaries. Secondly-They shall faithfully examine all candidates for the Million, and recommend fuch, and only fuch, a they judge to be plous, able, judicious and experienced Minif. ters of the gospel. Thirdly-When the committee recommen! a Missionary, they finall determine the time of his Mission, and the places where the duties thereof shall be performed; which shall be in such new settlements in the United States, or the Canadas, where the inhabitants are destitute of a preached gospel, an cannot obtain it. And the Missionaries shall keep a fair account of their expences, during their Mission, and make due returns the committee of the same, together with a journal of their till And if more money has been furnished to them than the have found necessity for, they shall return the same to the Tree furer of the committee: but if the sum advanced has not beefufficient to defray their necessary expences, such deficiency st. be made up to them, if the state of the fund will admit of it. - i Fourthly—The committee shall furnish each Missionary with fur fum, but of the Treasury, as they shall judge sufficient to be his expences during his Mission, and no more, unless the spec circumstances of the Missionary require some extra consideration in which case they shall have a right to act discretionary. ly—The Treasurer shall keep a particular account of all the sur contributed; and of all monies disbursed; and the Clerk six keep fair records of the proceedings of the committee, both c which shall be annually exhibited to the Association, and public ed in their minutes for the satisfaction of the Churches.

This Affociation shall have a right to alter any of these coles, or make such new ones, at any of their annual meetings, time and experience shall point out to be for the better. And Church disposed to contribute, shall have a right to disconte their contributions at any time when they think proper, upliving the reasons of their so doing.
