#### Circular Letter.

The Shaftsbury Association, convened at Shaftsbury, June 3d & 4th, 1818:—To the several Churches which they represent, sendeth Christian Salutation.

BELOVED BRETHREN,

THROUGH the abounding mercy of a covenant God, we have been privileged to assemble with the saints from different parts of Zion. With joy we have heard of the conquests of Zion's King. It has refreshed our souls.—It is, indeed, as good news from a far country; as cold water to a thirsty soul. While we adore the riches of his grace, manifested in the conversion of many souls, we anticipate with sacred rapture the dawning of that glorious morn, when he who is now King of Saints shall reign King of Nations; when the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth, as the waters now cover the sea.

In view of this glorious era, our thanksgivings ascend to the author of every good and perfect gift, who hath inclined the hearts of so many thousands to cast their mite into the missionary treasury, that the heralds of the cross may be enabled to unfurl the banners of salvation, and proclaim redeeming grace and dying love to the poor benighted Pagan, to the wandering and outcast Indian.—While we rejoice with thanksgiving at their benevolence, may we unitedly pray the great Head of the Church, that the souls of those from whom the Missionaries receive pecuniary aid may be watered with the rich streams of divine grace; that together we may rejoice in the fulness of that salvation which cost a Saviour's blood.

BRETHREN, while we rejoice, let us be exceedingly eareful to discriminate. There are sometimes wolves in sheep's clothing, who love the fleece, but care little for the flock. Of such we have need to stand in fear.

Our blessed Lord was careful in instructing his servants what to teach, as well as how to practice. His commands were—"As ye go, preach, saying the kingdom of Heaven is at hand." Repentance toward God, and faith in Jesus Christ, are the only conditions of salvation; and these conditions are in the covenant of redemption, made between the Father and the Son before the foundation of the "I lay down my life for the sheep. I give unto them eternal life, and they shall never perish." This was the doctrine which Jesus taught: Yes, blessed be God-"I will, and they shall, thy people shall be willing in the day of my power." Again, Jesus taught—"I and my Father are one; one, equal in power, wisdom and truth. Before the world was, I am." Again, Jesus taught that he was king and lawgiver in Zion; that his kingdom was not of this world; that he had chosen his people out of the world; and that they must be separate both in faith and practice, deny themselves, take up the cross and follow him.

But, Brethren, how many are they, who say, away with this doctrine of a covenant made between the Father and and the Son: They are never chosen until they are born again: Christ died for the whole world; denying the particular redemption of the sheep of Christ; when Christ says positively—"I lay down my life for the sheep, and they shall never perish." Ah, say they, not so: He loves his people no longer than they are obedient; thus placing the salvation of man on the feeble tenor of man's obedient.

ence. Others there are, who deny the divinity of the Saviour; while others deny that he is King in Zion, in distinction from this world. Thus, in many instances, are the truths of God perverted, and the hearts of the children are caused to mourn.

Let us then, beloved Brethren, contend earnestly for the faith once delivered to the saints; that faith which works by love and purifies the heart. Let us pray for the influences of the Holy Spirit; that pernicious doctrines may be purged from the Zion of God; that the simplicity of gospel truth may more abundantly prevail; and since God is not leaving us without a witness of the power of his efficacious grace, let us then be encouraged, that Jesus will take to himself his power and reign; that he will make his truths shine brighter and brighter until the more perfect day. Let us press forward in this glorious cause, until we are called to lay down these bodies in the grave; that we may resign ourselves to the dust in the glorious hope of a glorious resurrection, where soul and body shall be united, and we, with all the ransomed millions round the throne, unite in that grand chorus—"Not unto us, not unto us, but unto him who has washed us in his own blood, be praise for ever and ever"

Our interview has been pleasant and agreeable. We can say with the spouse—"We sat down under his shad-

ow, and his fruit has been sweet to our taste."
