TUESDAY, October 19, 1790.

I. **B**ROTHER *Isaac Backus* delivered the introductory sermon from 1 *Sam.* xxii. 1, 2.

II. After worship proceeded to business.--Brother *Simeon Brown* was chosen Moderator, and brother *Valentine W. Rathbun*, Clerk.

III. Letters from the churches were read.

VI. Appointed brethren Afa Spalding and James Brown to draw a letter to the corresponding associations.

VII. Received the minutes of the baptist association, held at Philadelphia, October 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th, 1789.

VIII. We having received information that there are proposals for reprinting the HOLY BIBLE, in different parts of America;—and viewing it a matter of the highest importance to all denominations of Christians, and truly interesting to posterity, that the sacred volume, to which we all appeal, as the standard of truth, be correct, and the purity of the holy Scriptures preserved; and being requested by the Warren association to unite in presenting an address to Congress on this important subject,——

Voted, That our brethren Timothy Wightman, Simeon Brown, Eleazer Brown, Sands Niles, and Valentine W. Rathbun, be appointed a committee, in behalf of this association, to prepare and transmit a petition to Congress, requesting their attention to the several impressions of the Bible now making; representing the importance of accuracy

in these impressions ; and earnestly praying that they would take such measures, as the constitution may permit, that no edition of the Holy Bible, that only rule of our faith and practice, be published in these United States, without careful inspection, and being certified to be free from error.

IX. Letter to the corresponding associations according to order of yesterday, was brought in, read, &c. and approved.

X. Appointed our brethren Abel Palmer, and Reuben Palmer, messengers to the Warren association ; brethren Solomon Sprague, Pardon Tillinghast, and James Sheldon, to Shaftsbury ; and brother Valentine W. Rathbun, to that at Philadelphia, and the United Associations in Virginia.

XI. Appointed our brother Sands Niles, and Valentine W. Rathbun, to draw a letter to an association lately formed at Danbury, in this State, desiring union and correspondence with them ; and chose brother Eliphalet Lester, our messenger to them, to make known our request at their next annual convention.

(CIRCULAR LETTER.)

THE messengers of the several baptist churches, belonging to the Stonington association, met in Stonington, October 19, 1790 ;

To the churches with whom they are connected, send Christian salutation.

BELOVED BRETHREN,

THE kind LORD having indulged us with another anniversary interview, we would inform you that we have enjoyed a good degree of harmony in our present meeting ; and though we have received good tidings of the marvellous displays of divine grace from some of our churches ; yet, we fear that there is too great a declension among us, in general. Suffer us therefore, dear brethren, to remind you of the necessity of a firm attachment to, and practice of the laws, rules, and ordinances of JESUS CHRIST, as the indispensable duty of every Christian. The prevalence of errors, delusions, heresies, and false doctrines at the present day, which introduce contentions, animosities, and

and schisms among professors of Christianity, demand our serious attention. We, who profess to be the disciples of Christ, baptized according to the apostolic order, ought, at this alarming crisis, to arm ourselves with every gospel weapon, and to oppose the enemy, in whatever form or shape he may appear, to lead or divert us from the truth,—"The sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God," the man of our counsel, and rule of our faith and practice, is a very necessary weapon, in our christian warfare; and that, which, if skilfully handled, may enable us to put the enemy to flight,—That we may be enabled to a proper use of this weapon, the necessity of the personal study of the holy Scriptures is obvious; for "every one of us shall give account of himself to God;" and that we may rightly understand the sacred passage, we are commanded to "ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not:" the key of the sacred cabinet is his,—he "openeth, and no man shutteth; and shutteth, and no man openeth."—But though our understandings may be enlightened, if our daily practice is inconsistent therewith, by countenancing the unfruitful works of darkness, we make ourselves transgressors, and thereby build the things that we once destroyed; for whatsoever is not of faith, is sin; and instead of obeying the command of God, to let our light shine, we veil the light; but if we constantly practice agreeable to the laws, rules, and ordinances of Jesus Christ, according to the primitive order, as exhibited in the Word of God, we may thereby shew forth the praises of him, who hath called us out of darkness, into his marvellous light; and have cause to hope that the blessing of our God, in the out-pouring of his Spirit, will attend us; and that we shall be instrumental of the conversion of sinners from their errors, heresies, and delusions; and thereby put a stop to contentions, schisms, and animosities; which would remind us of that happy æra, when the knowledge of the glory of God, shall cover the earth, as the waters fill the sea, and when all shall know the Lord, from the least unto the greatest.

DEAR BRETHREN,

Let us all be engaged to maintain the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace, that we may have cause to hope that the God of peace will be with us, and bless us, AMEN.
