Proceedings of the WARREN-ASSOCIATION,

In their Meeting at NIEDFIELD, September 13, 14. 1774.

A CCORDING to appointment the messengers of our respective churches mer at Medsield, September 13. when Elder Hizekiah Smith, preached a suitable sermon from Exod. xx 22. Then elder John Gano was chosen moderator, and elder Hezekiah Smith, clerk; after which letters from the churches were read, which describe their stare to be as follows.

Then we proceeded. 1. To read a letter from New-port association, wherein they express their readiness to assist us in any prudent measures to obtain sull religious liberty.

2. Received a letter from the Philadelphian affociation, wherein our beloved brethren, elder John Gano, and elder William

William Van Horn, were appointed their messengers to us. Also a letter from the association in South Carolina.

- 3. Upon an application made by the church in New-Salem, and examination into their standing, they were received into this association, with their messens, elder Samuel Bigelow, and David Pierce; the number of their members is 16.
- The church in Gafton, in like manner, was received with their messengers, Joseph Rice, and Jacob Whipple; their number is 22.

Adjourned to next Merning.

Sept. 14. Met at 8 in the morning.

- 5. A baptist church in Liecester, was received with their messengers, Ibomas Holman, and Joseph Bartlet; their number 12.
- 6. Application was made to the affociation by the church in I bompson; but as the messengers from Royalson, objected against it because of a difficulty that lay between them, it was judged expedient not to receive said church at this time; but both parties were advised earnestly to labour for a reconciliation.
- 7, Elder Smith was appointed to draw the circular letter to the churches.
- 8. Elder Isaac Backus, was appointed our messenger to the Philadelphian association, and elder Van Horn, was desired to draw up a letter from us to them; also the association of Swanzey and South Carolina.
- 9. A request was made to the afficiation from our suffering triends of Warwick, for help in their distresses on account of their late sufferings. Voted to recommend a collection for them among all our churches.

- and appointed elder Hunt, to draw up an answer to it.
- Charlestown South Carolina, to raise a fund for Rhode-Island college, viz By recommending to every member to pay six pence sterling annually for three years successfully to their elder, or some suitable person: This money to be paid to the treasurer of the college.
- 12. The same agent and committee for the baptists in this province, who served the last year, were continued.
- 13. Agreed upon the following supplies for destirute Churches, viz. For Framingbam, elder Seamans, the second Lord's day in Odober — Eleer Rich the second in November.—Elder Alden, the lecond in Dicember. Albford, elder Warren, the second Lard's day in December.—Elder Hicks, the third in Offober.—Elder Seamans, the second in November.—Brother Jones, the second in January.—Elder Coding, the second in March.—Elder Belau, the fourth in April.—Elder Alden, the second in May. Supplies for Grafton church.—Elder Alden, the second Lord's day in November. - Elder Seamans, the second in March—Brother Jones, the second in April— Elder Hicks, the second in June. Supplies for Liecester. Elder Martin, the last Lord's way in November-Elder Rich, the second in May-Elser Alden, the second ia June-Elder Hunt, the first in Septemoer. Supplies for Montague. Elder Bigelow, the first Lord's day in November, and the first in March.—Elder Hicks, the thud in June-Elder Belau, the lecond in August.

Concluded to hold the association next year at Warren, the Tuesday after the first Wednesday in September, at two o'Clock afternoon.—Elder Nathaniel Green to preach the sermon; or in case of tailure, elder Hunt.

A Circular Letter to the Churches.

Beloved Bretbren,

WITH this letter we fend you our christian salutations, withing you grace, mercy and peace from our Lord Jesus Christ. Our sister churches in general met at this place according to agreement; and we have the pleasure to find that they are in peace among themselves; though obliged to complain of, and mourn over the low state of religion.—Yet, blessed be God, this is not universally the case: From some of the churches we have good tidings. The Lord hath not forsaken them; but has visited them with the outpouring of his Spirit. In consequence of which there has been an ingathering of souls: Additions of such, we trust, as shall be saved. In this twofold view of things, we are called to mourn with those who mourn, and to rejoice with those who do rejoice.

It is the advice of your brethren now met in association, To stand fast in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made you free: Be careful not to imbibe and nourish a spirit of bondage. Endeavor to walk with God as did Enoch, and to promote vital piety at all times; labor that your light may shine before men, that they seeing your good works, may glorify your Father who is in heaven. Encourage promising and useful gists amongst you; and guard against those strangers who appear under the character of ministers of Christ, but bring no credentials with them; for many deceivers are gone out into the world. And as it is a day of great affliction, when our civil rights are invaded, and our religious privileges also in danger, we have concluded to recommend to you tour days in the course of the ensuing year for fasting

and prayer. The first on Friday before the last Lord's day in November.—The second on Friday before the last Lord's day in February.—The third on Friday before the last Lord's day in May.—The fourth on Friday before the last Lord's day in August. Now wishing you much of the divine presence, and a spirit of grace and supplication, so much needed in this day of great calamity, we subscribe,
