Their next meeting is to be at Northwood, the second Wednesday in June next; and the Elders Hezekiah Smith and Thomas Gair are appointed our Messengers to them.
- 5. Our Elders Backus and Seamans, are appointed our Mellengers to the Stoningson Association.
- 6. Elder Thompson of Swanzey, was received to act with us.

- 7. As it is a time of the prevalence of errors of every kind, and of the apostacy of many from the faith of the goipel, it is recommended to the churches, that they express in their annual letters to the Association, their particular adherence to the doctrines of grace.
- 8. Ilder Gair was appointed to draw a form of a letter to our fifter Affectations.
- 9. Accounts were received from various parts of our coun ry, that distress has lately been mode upon a number of our brethren and friends, for the support of a way of worship which we conscientiously distent from; which is not only a violation of the law of God, but also directly against the fundamental principles of the late revolution in America: therefore this Affociotion are resolved to unite in the most prudent and vigorous measures, for putting a stop to these oppressions, and to maintain the just rights of our beethren and friends; and for that end do make choice of the following commirce of guevances, to act in this caule according to their bell discretion; and we will recommend it to our several societies to communicate their proportion of the necessary expense hereof. The committee cholen for this purpole are our beloved Elders, Stillman, Skillman, Smith of Haverbill, Backus, and Blued.

A circular letter to our Churches being prepared by Elder Stillman, was unanimously approved uf, and is now addressed to them, as follows:

Dearly Baloved,

THE plan of divine government is as ancient as eternity, and as immutable as the nature of JEHOVAH. Infinite wisdom hath adjusted all its parts, and supercedes the recessive, yea, the possibility of any change in it. His purpose shall stand and be will do all his pleasure. Yet with respect to us, clouds and darkness are about him.— Let us however, rejoice in this, that he sees the end from the beginning; contequently all events, from the greatest to the least, are under his direction. The government is in the best hands, and the end shall be glorious. The Lord is now carrying on his great designs, and hath alrea-

American revolution, which hath been acc invites our attention. This great event, doubtless, stands closely connected with many others, which will take place in their order, and unite in one glorious end, even the advancement and completion of the Redeemer's kingdom. On his shoulders the government of both the church and the world rests. It is right that he should govern both, that he may caute the events of the one to subserve the interest of the other. The church being his greatest object, all things, by his direction, tend to promote her prosperity.

The divine conduct towards America, makes a distinguished figure in the history of providence. With what a surprising progress have we stepped up to our present importance and rank amongst the nations! The mere man of this world may confine his attention in this matter to our freedom and independence, with their consequent advantages, while the man of real religion entertains more noble thoughts. He views it as design'd by the Lord to advance the cause of Christ in the world; or as one important step towards bringing in the glory of the latter day. Alseady hath the American revolution extended its salutary influence to distant nations. It has awakened their attention to their civil interests, and made the principles of liberty better understood than ever; therefore it ought to be considered by us as one capital blow at the kingdom of the beast. A considerable degree of light hath broke forth on the lands of superstition and ignorance. And as light or sacred knowledge shall be dissufed, Antichrist will be destroyed. Thus are we taught by the inspired apostle: Whom the Lord shall consume by the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming : 2d. Thess ii. 8. As truth prevails error shall decrease; and prevail it will till the whole earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, and all false religion totally absorbed. It follows then, that the best way to dellroy error is by propagating the truth as it is in Jesus. To this end a free intercourse

amongst the nations was necessary. The discovery of the Magnet, and the art of navigation have not only been a means of enriching the commercial world, but of spreading the glorious gospel through the earth. Nor is it at all improbable, that America is reserved in the mind of Jehovah, to be the grand theatre on which the divine Redeemer will accomplish glorious things. Many such things have already taken place amongst us, since these sixtings of the sun saw the salvation of the Lord; all which are but as a drop of the bucket if compared with the glory of that day, when Christ Jesus will ride forth conquering and to conquer. If we observe the signs of the times, we shall find reason to think he is on his way. Let all the churches then say, Even so come Lord Jesus, come quickly.

Through the goodness of GOD we have met in peace; and though many of the churches complain of luke-warmness, and that there are but sew instances of conversion among them, we with pleasure inform you, that there have been great revivals in some places, and considerable additions made to particular churches. Let us give glory to GOD that he hath not lest himself without witnesses, and earnestly beseech him to grant us a more universal effusion of the Holy Ghost.

And now suffer the word of Exhortation:

Guard against the numerous and dangerous errors that are abroad in the world. Many have departed from the saith; by which we know that it is the last time. Stand sast in this evil day, and contend earnestly for the saith once delivered to the Saints. Be strict in your observance of the discipline of the churches; as being of the greatest consequence to their purity and glory. Maintain the christian tempers, and live daily as becomes the gospel. Let your lights shine before men, and love and union abound; so will the world take knowledge of you that you have been with Jesus Christ. AMEN.
