1. A T two o'clock, P. M. Brother Maxcy, according to appointment, preached the introductory Sermon, from Rev. i. 16: And he had in his right hand seven stars: and out of his mouth went a sharp two-edged sword.

2. After publie worship, chose Brother Nosh Alden,

Moderator, and Brother Joseph Grafton, Clerk.

3. Read the letters from the several churches, and took the following account of the members who have been added, dismissed, excluded, or who have died the past year, and the whole number in each church.

4. Adjourned 'till 8 c'clock to-morrow morning.

WEDNESDAY, Sept 12.

Met according to adjournment.

5. Received minutes from the Philadelphia Association; letter and minutes from the Charleston Association; from the Woodstock Association, a letter, but no minutes; from the Vermont, letter and minutes, by the hand of Brother Bailey, their messenger; a letter from the New-Hampshire Association; a letter and minutes from the Baptist General Committee of Virginia; a letter and minutes from the Shaftsbury Association, by the hand of Brother Mossiet, their messenger; a letter from the Bow-doinham Association: also minutes from the Stonington Association.

- 6. Read, and approved the circular letter, propared by Brother Baldwin. Also,
- 7. The corresponding letter, prepared by Browher Grafton, was read, and approved.
- 8. The church in Colerain, finding it more convenient to meet with the Shaftfoury Association, requested to be dismissed for that purpose; Voted, to grant their request.
- 9. The church in Rehoboth, and Southington, having, for a number of years, neglected sending either letter or messengers to the Association; Voted, that we consider them as not belonging to this body.
- 10. The first Baptist church in Newport, at their reguest, is lest out of the minutes.
- 11. A Quere. Whether the judgment, or result of an ecclesiastical council, is more than advisory? Answered unanimously in the negative.
- 12. After conversation upon the difficulties which subfist between the first and second church in Middleborough, advised them to a mutual conference.
- 13. Entred upon business relative to the education fund. The VIIth. article, "Which confines the education of all those who shall receive assistance from this institution, to Rhode-Island College," was objected to, by the church at Newton. After a candid and deliberate conversation upon the point,

Voted, that the VIIth. article of the Baptist education fund be erazed.

14. Proceeded to the choice of Trustees: agreeable to the plan introduced the last year, "So many of the Baptist Fellows of Rhode-Island College, who are members of churches, shall be Trustees of this charity; the remaining number shall be elected (by ballot) by the Warren Association." Of this description were sive, viz. Doctor Stillman, Messrs. Hezekian Smith, William Williams, Jonathan Maxcy, and Robert Rogers. The remaining seven were chosen by the Association, and are as follows:

follows: Mestrs. Isaac Backus, Joseph Grafton, Noah Alden, Thomas Baldwin, Thomas Green, George Robinson, and Isaiah Parker.

- vin, Mr. Green, and Mr. Grasson, be a committee to whom any persons, or churches, aggrieved, by being taxed to other denominations, may apply for advice.
- 16. Received and read a letter, figned by feven respectable Ministers, belonging to the Shafisbury and Vermont Affociations, containing "A proposal for a General Committee, to be composed of delegates sent from each Baptist Association in New-England; and if this Association should approve the proposition, they may appoint the time and place for their first meeting. It is supposed that fuch a committee would fave much riding and expense to all the Associations; for it would supersede the necesfity of fending messengers from one Association to another; and would be a place of general information and communication." Especially, it would be a great mean of collecting materials for the Baptist Annual Register, publishing by Dr. Rippon. From these considerations, and others that might be mentioned, which we view as tending greatly to promote religious knowledge; Voted, that this Association approve the proposal for a General Committee: And that the Town of Adams, in this Commonwealth, be the place, and the last Wednesday in June, 1793, the time of their first meeting. Also Voted, That our Brethren Isaac Backus and Joseph Grafton be our delegates to the General Committee.
- 17. Appointed our Brother Peter P. Roots messenger to the Philadelphia Association; Moses Kenny and Abel Wood to the Woodstock Association; Hezekiah Smith, Abishai Crosman, and Samuel Fletcher, to the New-Hampshire Association: Abner Lewis and Joseph Graston to the Stonington. Isaac Kenny and Nathan Dana to the Shaftsbury: To the Vermont, Samuel Webster and Nathan Dana.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

DEARLY BELOVED,

his kind designs of love to his chosen people: and although he may some times seem to frown, and bide his face from them, it may be with a design to try the strength of their faith, and prove the loyalty of their affection to him. This promise will always remain as a pledge of divine love, that "All things work together for good to them who love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." This we ought sirmly to believe, whatever difficulties may appear in the way of its accomplishment. But we are exceeding apt to misconstrue the divine conduct, not clearly discerning the various methods, by which God will accomplish those purposes, which respect his own glory, and the best good of his people.

When we indulge our reflections upon the present state of our churches, they cannot fail of affording a rational ground of joy; this joy will issue in a proper humility.

You will permit us to remind you of the importance of our being agreed in doctrine and practice. This was one chief object in our first forming affociations; and we have reason to believe that these annual conferences have been greatly blessed to that purpose: but we must be watchful and diligent, or our glory will depart from us. We are taught, by the word of God, that there will be a departure from the faith; and that many will give heed to seducing spirits; and that the way of truth will be evil spoken of. Error in different ways will make its appearance, and attack the church of God.

The time has been, when those who were unfriendly to our churches have endeavoured to represent us as heterodox in our principles, and vicious in our practice. But bleffed be God, through divine grace, we have been enabled.

abled, by a steady perseverance in the doctrine of Christ, to put to silence those gainsayers, and in some degree to stop the mouth of slander and detraction. But, brethren, we must not put off our armour, and forget that we are in an enemy's land. We are by no means out of danger; we have to "Wrestle against principalities and powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." We are called to "Contend earnestly for the faith once delivered to the saints;" and if we adhere closely to the discriminating doctrine of the Gross, and the peculiar ordinances of the Gospel, as they were nest instituted and delivered to the church, we may expose ourselves to the censure of some as being superstitious.

The spirit of the times, in which we live, is a tolerant, accommodating spirit; and complains but little of what men believe, in case they lead inoffensive lives. But are the principles of our holy Religion to be trifled with? furely no. If a man believes in the Koran of Mabomet, and is a good member of civil fociety, you will treat him as fuch; but are you to consider or treat him as a christian? It cannot be supposed. If another believes in Natural religion, and denies the Christian revelation, the exercise of the most profuse charity does not require you to receive him as a christian, let his life be as it may. These are plain cases; but there are others which are more difficult: there are many who profess to be the friends of Christianity, and yet thrip Christ of his eternal Deity, and rob him of the brightest gem in his Crown! "But we have not so learned Christ;" we cannot, we dare not give this point up; to us it is important! We have rested our salvation on Christ, not as a man, nor a created being, though of the highest order; but as being very God, and co-eternal with the Father! It would be robbery, and even blasphemy, for the first Archangel to claim equality with God. the blessed Jesus was not possessed of real and proper Deity, the Jews were right in faying that he blasphemed, in that he, being a man, made himself God. This sentiment lies at the foundation of the Christian seheme, and incorporates itsfelf with the whole of the system. We

We are happy to find that our brethren in this and our fifter Associations, throughout this vast Continent, appear to be sound in this very important article of our faith. Let us watch against all corruption in doctrine, and not give up a little here, and a little there, until we have not enough left to be worth contending for. Let us be careful that every sentiment that we believe, corresponds with the genuine spirit of the Bible; this we have adopted as our only rule of faith and practice.

You will permit us further to observe, that the positive institutions of Christ are sew, plain, and significant; and faint Paul commended his brethren for keeping the ordinances as they were delivered unto them; but when they mutilated one of them, he asks, what shall I say to you? shall I praise you in this? I praise you not; * and he immediately had recourse to the original institution, to establish his reproof. This was a direct way to convict their consciences, and no doubt served a much better purpose than many consequences drawn from human arguments.

But, Brethren, we must not stop here; we must add to sur faith virtue, if our sentiments be sound, and our exernal conformity to the rituals of Religion be exact. If supreme love to God does not rule in our hearts, glow in our affections, and have a commanding influence upon our lives and tempers, our religion will appear to all around us to be no more than an empty name. May we then cultivate every moral and social virtue, and endeavour to be uniform in our profession and practice: If this he not the case, we shall reproach that cause which ought to be dearer to us than life.
