### Tuesday, September 9, 1806.\*

A Thalf past two o'clock, agreeably to appointment, Brother Thomas Baldwin delivered the introductory sermon from 1 Thessalon. v. 12, 13. And we beseed you; brethren, to know them which labour among you, and are over you in the Lord, and admosish you; and to esteem them very highly in love for their works' sake. And be at peace among yourselves. After which collected for the widows and children of deceased ministers.

2. Chose Brother Stephen Gaño, Moderator, and Brother

Thomas Baldwin, Clerk.

3. After prayer by our effected Brother Dr. Rogers, proceeded to read the letters from the Churches, and took the following account of the members added, dismissed, excluded, or who have died the past year, and the present number in each Church.

N. B. The names of ordained ministers are in small capitals; licensed preachers in italic. Those ministers with this mark\* were not present. Churches marked thus we had no information from this session. Vacant churches distinguished by a dash——.

At fix o'clock met for public worship. Brother Andrews preached from Jude ver. 21. Keep yourselves in the love of God.

4. Met according to adjournment. Prayer introductory to

business by Brother Wilson.

5. Appointed Brethren Messer, Andrews, and Boyd, a com-

mittee to consider and report an answer to the several questions

proposed in the letters.

6. The circular letter, prepared by Brother Bradley, was read and accepted. The corresponding letter prepared by Brother Ellis was also read and accepted. Appointed Brother Bolles to write the circular letter for next year, and Brother Collier the corresponding.

Received a communication from the Secretary of the Education Society, giving a statement of the Treasury in May last, by which it appears that there was then in the Treasurer's hands, in Bank stock, and other securities, 2023 dollars 35 cents. Donations were presented by Messrs. Gano, Sawyer, and Starkweath-Voted, to recommend to the churches of this Association to contribute to the fund of the Education Society.

Whereas several churches have already had contributions for printing the scriptures in the Eastern languages; Voted, to recommend the same to all the churches in our connexion, and

that the monies be forwarded to Dr. Stillman.

10. Appointed the following brethren Messengers to corresponding Associations. To the New-York, Pitman and Bradlee; Stonington, Cornell and Bradlee; Woodstock, Andrews; New-Hampshire, E. Nelson, Baldwin, and Batchelder; Shaftsbury, Cornell; Bowdoinham, E. Williams, and J. Convers; Groton Union Conference, Gano, kathbun, E. Nelson, and Eddy; Sturbridge, Gano, Cornell, Rathbun, Abbott, and Jencks; Ley-

den, Robinson, Andrews, and J. Dyer.

Received the following collections and donations for the Missionary Society. From a friend 6 dollars; from another 10 dollars; from the Second Church in Newport 26 dollars; from the Second Baptist Church in Providence, 6 dollars 50 cents; from Attleborough Church, 26 dollars 32 cents; from a Brother, 5 dollars; from two semales, 2 dollars; from the First Church in Chelmsford, 7 dollars; from the First Church in Hanover, 7 dollars; from Deacon Tilly, 10 dollars; from three others, one dollar each; from a female friend in Connecticut, 2 crowns. Total, 111 dollars 2 cents. It is still recommended to the Churches to aid and encourage this evangelic inflication, by subscribing or contributing to its funds.

12. The Committee to whom was referred a question of advice, from the Second Church in Chelmsford, reported as their opinion, "That it is expedient for the Association to appoint a Committee to repair to the place, and investigate the matter as far as they can, and report at our next meeting." This report was read and accepted; and Bret hren Baldwin, E. Williams, E. Nelson, Batchelder, and Bolles, appointed for the above purpose.

13. Query from the Church in Londonderry respecting the lawfulness of instrumental music, in the worship of God, was referred to the same Committee, who reported the following as their opinion: "That the New Testament neither expressly sanctions nor prohibits it; and therefore, that each Church should act in the case according to its own views of duty." Read, and accepted.

14. Voted to appoint a Committee to prepare and report a Catechilm, which they may judge proper to be taught our children, and that the same be brought forward at the next meeting of this Association. Appointed for the above purpose, Brethren Stillman, Baldwin, and Bolles.

15. Supplies for Medfield; Elder Clark, 1st Lord's day in November, and 3d in April; Brother Read, 1st in April, 1st in

June, and 3d in July.

16. Voted to hold our next Association at the Baptist meeting. house in Salem, on the Tuesday after the first Wednesday in September next, at 2 o'clock, P. M.

17. Appointed Brother Gano to deliver the introductory fer-

mon; in case of failure, Brother Rathbun.

The business being finished about 1 o'clock, the Moderator closed the meeting by a very impressive exhortation to the Ministers and Brethren, and concluded by solemn prayer.

N. B. Agreeably to the vote of last year, the Churches are requested to present their money for the Minutes, when they pre-

sent their letters.

At 3 o'clock, Dr. Rogers, of Philadelphia, preached again to the people, from Isa. xxviii. 16. And in the evening, Brother Batchelder of Haverhill, from Eccl. xii. 13. The attention of the people continued to the last, without the least perceivable abatement. During this interview we have enjoyed much heartfelt pleasure; and finally parted with mutual wishes for each other's happiness, and for the general prosperity of the Redeemer's kingdom.

#### CIRCULAR LETTER.

The MINISTERS and MESSENGERS of the WARREN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION to the Churches they represent, send Christian salutation.

#### BELOVED BRETHREN,

WE have been favoured with another opportunity of sitting in one place, of hearing the glorious gospel of Christ, of receiving many interesting accounts of the prosperity of Zion; and of unanimously looking unto God for the stretching forth of his almighty arm, to remove the veil spread over all nations, that his sons may come from far, and his daughters from the ends of the earth.

Though we have taken sweet counsel together, and have been refreshed from the presence of the Lord, yet our tender regards for you are not forgotten. You undoubtedly expect, that some important subject, though briefly considered, should be laid before you as a testimony of our brotherly love and increasing fellowship.

As many, within a few years, have professed to be new creatures, and as revivals still continue among the churches in our connexion, we view it necessary to send you a few remarks upon

Regeneration and some of its happy effects.

Regeneration is wrought instantaneously in the heart by the Holy Spirit. The Spirit being the agent, the heart, or man, must be the subject, and consequently is completely passive, and

does no more towards affilting the Spirit, than Adam did towards his creation. This is confirmed by John, who faid concerning those who believe, John i. 13. Which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. James is very bold and faith, i. 18. Of his own will begat he us with the wor'd of truth. The sinner discerns not the things of the Spirit, neither does he love the holy and amiable character of God, till this unseen and internal work is effected.

Though God displays great, glorious, and irresistible power upon the subject in doing this work, yet he feels no possible abridgment of his free agency, or the least perceptible impediment thrown in the way of his will, to obstruct its choosing freely. For the Spirit's entrance into the heart is so quick and power-tul, that the will is immediately turned from a state of opposition to God into a state of reconciliation to him, without feeling at the same time any reluctance, or being deprived of its freedom. "Thy people shall be willing in the day of thy power." Psa. ex. 3. "For as the rain cometh down, and the snow from heaven, and returneth not thither; so shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth; it shall not return unto me void; but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it." Isa. lv. 10, 11.

When the inspiration of the Almighty giveth the sinner life, he perceives no intermediate space, or time, in which he was neither dead nor alive; neither for, i or against God; neither in the broad way to hell, nor the narrow way to heaven. "You hath he quickened, who where dead in trespasses and sins." Eph. ii. 1. "For the hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God; and they that hear shall live." John v. 25. These passages fully illustrate, that there is no possible medium between death and life; therefore, it must inevitably follow, that regeneration is an instantaneous work or opera-

tion of the Spirit in the heart.

Though this work is so great, and astonishing to angels and men, yet it adds no new faculties to the foul; but turns them all from selfishness, wicked debasement, and fixed rebellion, to serve the living and true God with unspeakable satisfaction. This assertion will appear clear and consistent, if we consider the state of those whom the Spirit regenerates. They are sinners, who are in darkness, bondage, and spiritual death; children of wrath, haters of God, and hating one another. The grand enemy of all righteousness has deceived, blinded, and led them away captive; they have voluntarily bowed their necks, and become heartily engaged in his service, and actively industrious to support and extend his kingdom. They are so full of selfishness, uncleanness, lasciviousness, pride, wrath, strife, envy, murder, and all unrighteousness, that Jesus said, "Ye are of your father the devil, and the lusts of your father ye will do." John viii. 44. "Ye serpents, ye generation of vipers, how can ye escape the damnation of hell?" Matt. xxiii. 33. These passages, surrounded and strengthened with the whole circle of revelation, together with the history of all ages and the experience of all nations, unquest carably demonstrate, that man, with all his faculties, is in a state of alienation, shame and condemnation: that from the crown of his head even to the sole of his foot, there is no moral soundness in him.

In regeneration, he is raised up from this state of enmity, quickened, made free, broug.: out of darkness, and translated into the kingdom of God's dear Son. The wisdom, power, justice, grace, holiness, goodness, faithfulness, and unchangeable veracity of God, all consistently harmonize in Christ, and open before

the new creature a fountain of everlasting life.

Here we may notice some of those happy effects which the regenerate enjoy. The heart being turned to God, breaks with contrition, melts with love, believes with joy, expands with benevolence, bows to the feet of Jesus, with unreserved submission, and beholds in him every thing suitable to overwhelm with astonishment, and entertain with infinite delight, the vast throng of angels and saints in the everlasting kingdom of God.

Old things pass away, all things become new; repentance, unto life, flows; faith stretches forth her hand and takes hold on Jesus; and the soul all alive receives him, and can say, with an holy boldness, "This is my Beloved, and this is my Friend. He is fairer than the sons of men. He is the chief among ten thous-

ands and altogether lovely."

The foul being conformed to the image of God's dear Son, is justified. For whom the Son makes free, is free indeed. Christ is made unto the new-born soul, wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption. Where is boasting then? It is excluded by faith, which works by love, purifies the heart, and overcomes the world. The foul having this faith, looks back upon itself, and views with shame and confusion its awful opposition to God, its total depravity, and the justice and glory of that law which concludes all under fin and threatens them with endless punishment. Approving heartily of this holy law, it looks up to Jesus, who has fulfilled it, and by suffering and dying according to the determinate counsel of God, has become the end of it for righteousness to every one who believeth. Self-sufficiency and creature righteousness sink into insignificance; and selfemptying, self-abhorrence, and self-denial, find a residence in the The doctrine of Christ, which discloses his beautiful, amiable and perfect character, his God head fulness, and all things appertaining to his kingdom and glory, afford a pleasing theme of contemplation, thanksgiving, and boundless happiness.

The foul feels that union to Christ, which neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature shall be able to destroy. In fine, those who have been regenerated hunger and thirst after righteousness, and do often feel so strongly.

attached to Christ and his kingdorn, that they carnestly desire to drop their sinful bodies in the dast, and he above the skies, and live forever among the blood washed throng, in the refreshing presence of the Lord. O Brethren, come and learn of Jesus, who can do all things well. May he spread his infinite arms of compassion around you, make you useful, persevering, triumphant, and finally crown you with an everlasting and eternal weight of glory. Amen.

#### CORRESPONDING LETTER.

The WARREN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, affembled at Newport, State of Rhode-Island, September 9 and 10, to the Elders and Brethren of our Sister Associations, sendeth Christian salutation.

DEARLY BELOYED IN THE LORD,

As respects the kingdom of Immanuel upon earth, prospects are truly encouraging. The covenant of grace is, indeed, ordered in all things and sure. Even in the darkest times, the child of God has this consolation, "The Lord knoweth them that are his."

We live at an eventful period. Jehovah has been, and is still doing great things among the nations of the earth. And though all wars and fightings have their origin in the ungoverned lusts of men, and though the effects are truly dreadful, the believer can still sing, "The Lord reigneth, let the earth rejoice, let the isles be glad."

But while we have seen distress of nations, and perplexity, we have also seen the glory of the Lord arise and shine. The light of the gospel is even now diffusing still more extensively its genial influences, while thousands of poor perishing sinners, both in our own land, and among the benighted heathen, with joy draw

water out of the wells of falvation.

The people of these United States have been peculiarly savoured of Heaven. Upon these western shores have been as great displays of redeeming love, as in almost any quarter of the globe. All orders and ranks of men have largely shared in the blessings of the new covenant. In the fold of Christ, rich and poor meet together; master and servant become brethren in the Lord, and equally indebted to bleeding love; while all unite to sing, "Worthy is the Lamb." Let us therefore, again and again, compare our sentiments with the oracles of truth; let us ever cultivate a spirit of candour and meekness towards one another, and towards others; at the same time determine never to desert our standard, nor be ashamed of the least particular by which it is known, though it

cost us our lives and our all.

May the God of holiness purify our churches; may the God of peace cause his peace to rest upon them, giving at the same time the spirit of grace and supplication, till all slesh shall see his salvation together, as the mouth of the Lord of Hosts hath spoken.
