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MINUTES

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BETHEL ASSOCIATION

Held at the Baptift Church, on Jamey's Creek, Spartanhurgh County, South-Carolina, begun on Saturday, August 11th, 1742.

Two first days spent in public devotion.

MONDAY, August 13.

Z. Rev. Saunders Walker delivered an introductory discourse from 1 Sam. 4. 2.

2. Letters from 24 churches being read, the names of their delegate

were enrolled.

Rev. James Fowler, was elected moderator, and Mr. William Ford, clerk.

3. The delegares of the Charleston Association not attending, the letter and minutes of their last meeting, together with the letter and minutes of the General Committee of Baptists in Virginia, and a letter from the Rev. Oliver Hart, of Hopewell, New-Jersey, (handed by the Rev. J. Fowler) were severally read, and gave general satisfaction.

6. The let er and minutes of the Georgia Association, delivered by the Rev. Saunders Walker, being severally read; he was, as the amessenger, received into union and communion with us, and took his seat accordingly.

Five churches ap died for admillion into this affociation, and fatisfactory information being given by their delegates, of their faith and good order, they were received into our union.

The committee appointed last meeting, to visit the church on Middle Jork, Saluda, reported, that the grievances there, are happily removed.

A motion made at our last meeting respecting the ordination of applicate, was now taken into consideration. It is held as most adviseable, that the churches be careful not to admit any one to that office, but such as manifest

manifest real piety and promising gifts, and shall use every prudent mea ure for improvement in gospel knowledge. And that in order to their ordination, we advose the church to which the candidate for the ministry belongs, to call the assistance of three (or at least two) of such ministers in union, as they esteem men of repute and ministerial ability for such a business.

Adjourned to 9 o'clock to-morrow.

TURSDAY, 9 o'clock.

In. The Affociation took into confideration the case of Jacob Roberts and his church (at their own request) and proposed to hear all things they alledged against the churches of our union; provided, that they would subject themselves to the determination of the Affociation respecting them. They resused. We then called upon those members of our churches that had the most perfect knowledge of the transactions of the said Roberts and his church, to give a full relation thereof; upon which information, we approve of the conduct of our churches with them, and consider them in a state of disorder.

11. Agreed, that Rev Messes, Joseph Camp, John Hightower, William Woodward, and Joseph Logan, and Messes. Abraham Hargis and William Murphey, or any three of them, be a committee to settle a difference substituting between Genestie and Shackle-serry churches; and make report of their proceedings at our next meeting.

12. Reedy Fork Church extinct.

M'Dougal to the Georgia Association, Mr. Baylis Earle to the Charleston Association; also, on motion of the moderator, that Mr. Richard Shackle-ford abridge Mr. Hart's letter, and that it be our circular letter for this time; and that Rev. David Lilly write to the general committee of Virginia.

14. Being informed that a certain Jos. Williams is preaching as a Baptist minister in our vicinity: We warn all our churches to discourage him as a

disorderly person.

15. Mr. John Webb applied for restoration to the ministry; but could not be admitted.

16. Quere. Can persons excommunicated by one church, be admitted with propriety into sellowship with any other, before they have given satisfaction to that particular church, which they, as members thereof, have offended?

Ans. In case of two great distance from that particular church, to apply for re-admission; we think they may be admitted, on a confession of true repentance and sorrow for their offence: though we advise, that information be particularly given to the church from which they have been excommunicated.

17. The

17. The letter to Mr. Hart, together with the letters to the different efficiations, and the circular letter, were brought forward, read and

approved.

18. That the Rev. James Fowler be our messenger to the Charleston Association, to be held at Coofawhatchie on the Saturday before the first Sunday in November; and the Rev. Messes. William Woodward an John Chaistain, be our messengers to the Georgia Association, to be held the 3d Sunday in October.

19. Supplies. Cedar Spring, discretionally, Alexander M Dougal and Richard Wood. Bill's Creek, John Hightower, Richard Newport, Perminter Mo gan. Turkey Creek, Richard Shackleford, David Lily, George Tilghman. Paget's Creek, discretionally, William Woodward, Reuben

Rowland.

20. Money was collected for printing the minutes. Rev James Fowler appointed to superintend the business, and distribute them when printed.

"35. That our next Association be held at the place of our present

meeting, to begin the second Saturday in August.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The B.thet Asociation, convened the 18th of August, 1792, to the several churches we are connected with, greeting.

DEAR BRETHREN,

WE have by divine providence had a comfortable interview for a few days past in much love and harmony; we have considered what came before us which appeared necessary at this time respecting the cause of Christ in general, especially the churches we represent. You will find an count of those things in our minutes; we are happy to find that peace and harmony subsist in our churches in general.

We

We have lately/received a letter from our esteemed friend and broth a in the gospel, the Rev. Oliver Hart, of Hopewell, in New Jersey, addressed to our association, which contains some excellent advice and instruction on the doctrine and discipline of the church and we think we cannot do

better at present, than offer you a few extracts therefrom.

Brethren, permit us first to observe to you as individual faints often to call to mind the rock from which you were hewn, and the hole of the perwhence we usere digged; confider what a miferable, wretched, lott and undone estate you were in by nature; guilty, fithy, condemned, on the verge of eternal mifery, and altogether unable to help yourselves; this may serve to keep you humble and adore that fovereign, that diffinguishing grace which laid hold on your fouls to bring you into the marvelous light of the gospel of peace. Second, we would address a word to you as members of the churche. of Christ. "On this vine you have been baptized into Christ, and have put on Christ; you have inlisted under Christ's banner, and are bound to fight all his battles with the world, flesh and the Devil; those potent adversarie, and all their combined forces, you have to maintain a daily combat with, our grand enemy, &c. &c." "Yet fear not, victory in the end will declare in your favor, be faithful unto death and Christ will give you a crown of life, you have a name and a place in God's house. O fill up your place therein, whenever the church affembles for public worship or private business, let each make one of the party. Above all, guard against absenting from the Lord's table; may love to the precious, the fuffering Jesus ever constrain you to parcake of the symbols of his mangled body and streaming blood. To neglect divine inflitutions deeply wounds religion and argues a fickly foul; therefore, neglect not the allemb ing of yourtelves together as the manner of fome unworthy professies is."
