

4. Adjourned till to-morrow morning nine o'clock. Brother Whitman preached in the evening from Maish Ixii. 1.

THURSDAY, OSober t.

Met according to adjournment.

2. With heart-felt fatisfaction, we receive our brethren from Corresponding Associations, viz: Samuel Abbot, from the Waeren; minutes from the Leyden; and NATHANIEL COLE, from the Stonington.

2. Voted to fend our Minutes to the Woodkock, Shaftsbury, and Saratoga Associations, to open a correspondence with them in the exchange or Minutes.

- g. The Circular letter, prepared by brother Waters, and the corresponding by brother Leonard, were and and accepted.
- 4. Query from the second Church in Woodstock, "Is baptism a door into the visible Church?" Voted to postpone an answer until the next Association, that there might be opportunity for surther consideration upon the subject.
- 5. The committee, appointed by the Afforiation last year to enquire into the flate of the surfice Church in Wilbraham, reported, "there was not the visibility of a Church there," Voted to accept the report, and drop them from our Minutes.
- 6. Chose brethren Waters and Rand messens to the Warren Association;—brethren Ebenezer Lyscom and Rand to the Leyden;—brethren Hanks and Wightman, to the Stonington;—brethren Whitman, Rand, Hanks, Atwell and Shephard, to the Danbury.
- 7. Chose brother Rand to write the circular letter, and brother Atwell the corresponding, for the next year.
- 8. Voted to recommend to the Churches composing this Association, a contribution in April next for missionary purposes. Chose brethren Leonard, Waters, Wells, Crosby and Rand, a committee to receive monies contributed, and to lay them out as they may think proper.
- 9. Chose beethren Waters, Ledoyt and Leonard a committee to visit and enquire into the state and practice of South-Brimsield Church, relative to open communion, and report to the Association next year.
- 10. Victed that our Affociation meet next year at Leicester, on the last Wednesday of September, at two o'clock P. M. Brother Atwell to preach the introductory sermon, in case of the failure of brother Burt.
 - 11. Voted that brother Waters superintend the printing of the minutes.
- 12. Voted to recommend to the Churches to meet on the first Tuesday of every quarter, beginning with the first Tuesday of October 1807, for the purpose of uniting in solemn prayer to the throne of grace, for bleffings on Zion and a ruined world.



CIRCULAR LETTER.

The STURRRIDGE Association, to the several Chuches which we represent, wisheth grace, mercy and peace to be multiplied among you.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHAEN,

WE find it difficult, upon this occasion, to address you upon any thing new, as former circular letters have embraced almost every subject.—But since our Lord has enjoined upon all his creatures, the great duty of Lord permit us to address you on this subject.—He, who demands our

highest association, both implanted in us this noble passion, which ought to be displayed on God supremely, and inspire us with the love of His works and ways, as it renders the creature catable of glorifying God and enjoying Divine consolation, and of filling his days with usefulness on earth.—But alas! we find mankind destitute of these excellent virtues—They are opposed to God and his cause in this world, and consequently to their own happiness and salvation, haters of God and one another.

Thus you see this noble passion is used in a bad cause.—In order, therefore, to love God supremely, and to love what is lovely, and hate what is hateful, there must be a Divine work wrought in us by the spirit of God, regulating the disorderedness of our affection.—The love of God is first manifest to the soul, in effecting this great work; hence, we love him, because he sirst loved us.

But, Brethren, how shall we manifest our love, in the view of a wicked world, to the praise of His Grace, but in keeping his commands? In so doing, we discover to the world, that, of a truth, God has our highest affection. May we now call to view some of the requirements of the Head of the Church. First, let your light so thine before men, that, they, seeing your good works, may glorify your Father which is in Heaven. To which end, let us hold up the light of revelation by precept and example—and live and behave ourselves like those who maintain a solemn sonse of their accountability to God the Judge of all.—Secondly, Let us attend to His requirements as it respects our duty in His church; to walk in all the commands and ordinances of Christ blameless, and in a word, keep the ordinances as they were delivered. In so doing, we place the crown upon His head and acknowlege Him King in Zion.

Brethren, Wie do not see how we can manifest our love to God, in the view of Christians, but by keeping up a gospel discipline. May we faithfully execute the laws of Christ's house.

If a Brother be evertaken in a fault, let us deal with him in the sphit of the gospel, not report it abroad, but restore him if possible. Nevertheless, let us withdraw ourselves from every Brother, who continueth to walk disorderly.

The Apostles rule, in maintaining a visibility, is equality, that is, that each Brother do according to what he possesset—The observance of this rule will have the greatsst tendency to prevent covetousness, which ought never to be indulged in a Church.—Finally, Brethren, the object of gospel discipline is God's glory, the consolation of the Church, and the conversion of sinners to the faith of the gospel.—If we know these things, happy are we is we do them. Let love be without dissimulation, and may the God of peace bless you all with a zeal to promote his cause in this world, and with eternal selicity hereafter.—Aren.

N. B. Our meeting has been attended with a remarkable union and truly we can fay we have received fome of the clusters of the Heavenly Canon. Under the influence of the Divine Spirit, we can fay, it is good for us to be here.—Nevertheless, may the great Head of the Church bloss us all, in the way of duty, let our local situation be what it may.—Brethren, may we comember the words of our Lord,—By this shall all men know that yo are my Diving. If we have love one to another.

Dear Brethren,

WITH joy we welcome the return of another opportunity to inform you of our stedsastness in the eause of truth, and veneration for evangelic religion. While we often hear infidelity boldly afferting that the time is not far diffant, when enthulialing will be extirpated from the earth and the bible ank into general contempt, we are seriously urged to enquire relative to the future prospects of the church.
