

# MINUTES, &c.

#### WEDNESDAY, September 25, 1310.

- i. AT 10 o'clock A. M. a fermon was delivered by brother Ebenezer Burt, from Jeremiah 1. 45. "Surely the least of the flock shall draw them out." After which was a contribution for the widows of ministers deceased.
- 2. Chose brother Samuel Waters, Moderator, and brother Zenas L. Leonard, Scribe.
- 3. Read the letters from the Churches, and took the following minutes.

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Met according to adjournment.

- 5. Received Minutes and Messengers from our sister Associations, viz: brethren Graston, Andrews, Read, Bently and Paul, from the *Warren*; brethren Palmer and Cole, from the Stonington; brother S. King from the Leyden; brethren Babeock and Wightman from the Danbury.
- 6. Read and approved the Circular letter prepared by brother Leonard, and the Corresponding by brother Wightman,
- 7. Appointed Messengers to Corresponding Associations. To the Warren, brethren Bloss and Crosby. To the Stoningeton, brethren Palmer and Cooper. To the Leyden, brethren.

Bates, Smallidge and Burt. To the Danbury, brethren Palmer, Bloss and Pease. To the Shaftsbury, brother Pease.

- 8. Appointed brother Crosby to write the Circular Letter for next year; and brother Bloss the Corresponding.
- 9. Voted, that agreeable to the request of the 1st and 2d Churches of West-Springsield, and also the Church at West-sield, they be dismissed from this Association, in order to join a new Association which is in contemplation to be formed in their vicinity, in case it should be formed. Appointed brethren Wells, Leonard, Atwell, Pease and Bennett a committee to meet with the brethren in conference at Westsield, on the last Wednesday in August 1811, to inquire into the expediency of forming this proposed Association.
- this vicinity to form a Missionary Society.
  - on the last Wednesday of September, at 10 o'clock A. M. Brother Waters to preach the sermon; in case of failure, brother Bloss.
  - 22. Voted, that brother Waters superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes.
  - 13. Voted to continue the concert of prayer on the first Tuesdays of October, January, April and July.

Note. Whereas a man by the name of ELIJAH WIL-LIAMS, now residing in Sutton, has travelled in different parts of the country, under the character of a preacher; this is, therefore, to certify, that it can be proved that he is an abandoned character, now living in adultery.

## CIRCULAR LETTER.

The MINISTERS and MESSENGERS of the STUR-BRIDGE ASSOCIATION, to the several CHURCHES they represent, send Christian salutation.

DEAR BRETHREN,

PERMIT us for a few moments to address you on the neceffity, the value and the excellency of the Scriptures of truth.

A flight furvey of the character and condition of man will convince every reflecting mind of the indispensible necessity of divine revelation. As in the mass of creatureship all mankind are on a level, and no one man, or fet of men, is born to rule and govern the reft; so on the moral scale, all are found en a level, and no one man, or select number of men, is born with ability and wisdom sufficient to guide others in the way to heavenly blifs. All are dead in trespasses and fins, and there is none that docth good, no not one. By nature mankind are ignorant of the character of God, and also of them. selves. Who then of Adam's ruined progeny is found able to zuide either himself, or others in the way of salvation? Moreover the character of God could be revealed only by himself. Neither angels nor men were capable of doing this. fore it was necessary that a revelation of God, of eternal realities, and of man's deftination, should be produced by more than mortal agency. Then it was the day-star arose in the east on our benighted world. Jesus, the Mediator of the new sovenant, was brought forth to instruct, and ordained to rule. This wonderful Counsellor possessed, without measure, the fpirit of wildom, of counsel and might. He is the light of the world and the day-spring from on high. The holy scriptures are but the reflected and refracted rays of light which primastar, and Sun of righteousness. No doubt it was Christ himfelf who appeared first to our apostate ancestors in the garden,
called Adam from the bower, and bade mercy descend as on
the evening Zephyr. It was his spirit which dictated every
part of divine revelation. "Prophecy came not in old time
by the will of man, but holy men of God spake as they were
moved by the Holy Ghost." That part of truth which the
prophets were inspired to write in somer times, and also that
which the Apostles were inspired to write in later times, all
correspond with what Jesus delivered in person while he tabernacled here in stella. All must and does harmonize, because it
was dictated by the Lord of hosts, the God of eternal truth,
who changes not.

In revelation are delineated the character of God, and the character of man. Here the way of peace and pardon to dying men is perspicuously made known. Here is solved that great point, how God can be just, and yet justify the repenting finner. The scriptures are a light to the believer's feet. and a lamp to his path. They constitute one stream of that river, which makes glad the city of our God. They are an uncontaminated fountain of truth in every age. Error may assume what guise it pleases, and transform itself into ten thousand shapes, yet the word of God is able to detect it: Here is instruction for every creature, let his character, or condition be what it may. But it is the humble foul, who de-Eghts to hear this instruction, and cheerfully yields obedience to the truth. Here he discovers a golden mine of immense value. The more it is explored the more its worth is known. He receives grace for grace, and he is never deceived with counterfeits. Indeed, here unnumbered bleffings flow to ruined men. Here is food for the hungry; water, wine and milk for the thirsty; white raiment for the naked; balsam for the wounded; balm for the fick; and an eternal carminative

for fouls who are pained with fin, in every age and every clime. Whofoever will, is invited to come and partake without money and without price.

In this holy book, the humble believer finds the glorious promifes of his bleffed Redeemer fet in fair order, like the tree of life on either fide of the cryftal river, feen by the infpired John, in his heavenly vision. They are like apples of gold impictures of filver. In the midst of poverty, they afford to his foul durable riches in righteousness; and indeed they afford joy in adversity, health in sickness, consolation in sorrow, and life in death. By the aid of these promises, his focil rises as on eagles' wings, and through faith surveys the glories of the unseen world.

In the scriptures, Jesus has marked out for his people a humble blessed way. The path of duty is made plain before them. The word and spirit, if followed, will guide into all necessary truth. Let us then, beloved brethren, search the scriptures diligently for instruction, and wherever they point out the way, thither let us bend our course. Fearless of the world's despising, let us endeavor to follow the Lamb whitherfoever he goeth. While affemblies, and councils, fypods and conclaves feek to impose their dictums and their creeds on the world of mankind, let us regard them, in comparison with the scriptures, as dross and chaff, while we hear a voice from heaven, saying, "Cease ye from man; sall no man mafter on the earth, for one is your mafter even Christ." To conclude, let us ever keep in mind the words of the blessed Redeemer; "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you. If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed. Be thou faithful upto death and I will give thee a crown of life,"

#### CORRESPONDING LETTER.

The ELDERS and BRETHREN, composing the STUR-BRIDGE ASSOCIATION, convened at SUTTON, the last Wednesday in September 1810, to the ASSOCIATIONS with whom they correspond, send Christian salutation.

#### DEAR BRETHREN,

IT is one of the peculiar excellencies of the gospel to display the glorious perfection of Deity. For though God was possessed of all possible perfection in himself antecedent to creation—before angels or men were formed—yet in the formation of angels and men and heaven and earth the glory of his creating power and wisdom was made manifest; the morning-stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy. Here these holy intelligents beheld his glory, they were silled with wonder, rapture and devotion. In the government of divine providence, new glories were brought to view, when they cried holy, holy, holy Lord God Almighty: But in the wonderful condescension of the Mediator in coming into our world to obey that law which we had broken, and suffer that penalty, we had deserved, God's glory is brought to view in its fullness.

The angels cried, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace, good will toward men. Here inslexible justice, incomprehensible mercy, inviolable truth and infinite wisdom were brought to view in their full glory. In the dispensation of divine grace, when he brings the stranger home and turns the dispedient to the wisdom of the just, when

he brings the haughtiness of man down, and lays his lostiness low even in the dust, the same divine end is pursued, that God in all things may be glorisied. The employment of angels is subservient to the same purpose, and their songs tend to the same end. The Elders are casting their crowns at his sect, and giving honor and glory to Him that sits upon the throne, and to the Lamb sorever and ever.

#### DEAR BRETHREN,

Let us join with them in this important work in our affociated capacity. Let us not like the disciples of old contend who shall be greatest. But let us unitedly engage in advancing the glory of the great Creator. Let ministers not preach themselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord, and themselves as servants for Jesus' sake. Herein is our heavenly Father glorised in that we bear much fruit. Let us all endeavor to live soberly, righteously and godly in this present world. And may the great Head of the Church that was brought again from the dead through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in all things, working in you that which is pleasing in His sight, to whom be glory forever.—AMEN.
