### WEDNESDAY, September 25, 1811.

1. AT 10 o'clock A. M. a sermon was delivered by brother Samuel Waters, from 2 Cor. iv. 5. "For we preach not ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord; and ourselves your servants for Jesus sake."

#### CIRCULAR LETTER.

The MESSENGERS, composing the STURBRIDGE ASS 74' CHATION, to the CHURCHES they represent, sends Greeting:

#### BELOVED IN THE LORD of

AS the increase and glory of the Kingdom of Christ in. the world is of the greatest importance, and affords the mot. real pleafure to every believing heart; we therefore invite your attention to the delightful subject. A sew moments of time would fail us to enumerate all those great and precious promiles which foretel the glory and prosperity of the Church. of Christ in the latter day. Such as that Jesus shall reign till he hath put all enemies under his feet--of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end-that the. Mountain of the Lord's house shall be exalted above the top. of the Mountains, and the Nations flow to if and be favedand that the Redeemer shall possess the heathen for his inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possess. sion. For he shall not fail nor be discouraged till he have set judgment in the earth, and the Isles shall wait for his law. And as these and such like pro nifes are evidently fulfilling in the world, and it must appear to every observer, that ivissionary efforts are one particular means owned and bleffed of God for the accomplishment of those glorious things spoken concerning Zion ;-- I herefore, Brethren, we befeech and exhort you, as you defire the glory of Christ and the salvation of your fellow men, that you unite heartily with those who are engaged in this good work. It is with aftonishment we look on past ages, and see how little has been done to spread

to see the exertions of thousands, who seel for their sellow mortals in darkness, and in the regions of the shadow of theath.

# CORRESPONDING LETTER.

The STURBRIDGE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, met in KILLINGLY, Connecticut, September 25 and 26, 1811, to the SISTER ASSOCIATIONS, with whom we correspond, Sendeth Christian falutation.

#### BELOVED IN THE LORD,

THE rising glory of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ affords consolation to every humble heart. The government of this kingdom is on the shoulder of Immanuel; and there it must remain. The necessity of a divine Legislator for this Kingdom arises from the consideration that it is not of this world; confequently a spiritual one. If so, how can men of this world legislate in it? It is out of their jurisdiction. It devolves on a divine Saviour. If Jesus Chrix be a mere man then he is also inadequate to the undertaking. For how can s mere man explore the mental regions; mark all our fecret thoughts, and weigh every motive to action; or bring ever ry work into judgment, with every fecret thing whether good or evil? He plainly declared himfelf Judge of all mon when on earth, faith he The Father judgeth no man but hash committed all judgment to the Son. He weighs the actions of men; fearches their hearts, and tries their reins. In fire, the glorious King in Zion is omnipresent, beholding the evil and the good. The Lord Jefus is Lawgiver and Judge over his peopic.

Devils and wicked men have been engaged to remove the sceptre from his hand, but in vain. In vain did they attack his person when on earth; for by his death he destroyed the power of the prince of darkness. In vain has the Pope, with this Legares, Prelates, Cardinals and Frians, confronted the

Messiah to temove regal dignity from him.
