MINUTES, &c.

WEDNESDAY, September 29, 1819.

- 1. At ten o'clock, the introductory sermon (pursuant to appointment) was delivered by brother RUEL LAPHROP, from 1 Peter, v. 5; "Be clothed with hamility."
- 2. Organized by choosing brother Joseph Ellior, moderator, and brother Lerand Howard, clerk.

- 3. Proceeded to read the letters from the churches; and obtained the following account of the numbers restored, added by baptism and by letter, dismissed, excluded, and died, the last year, and the present number in each church.

14. Appointed the following committee, viz. Deac. A. Forbes, Nathl. Vilas, and Deac. Daniel Mason, to take under consideration the Constitution for an Agricultural Missionary Society, proposed by the Agent of the Baptist Board of F. Missions, and to report next year.

15. Sermon by Br. J. Going, from Ezek. xi. 19; and a collection of \$35,76, taken for the Education and Missionary Societies, to be

equally divided.

16. Association closed with an appropriate address by the Mod ef

ator, and prayer by Br. J. HIGBER.

The whole session was peculiarly harmonious, solemn and joyful-Truly we "sat together in heavenly places, in Christ Jesus."

After the business of the Association closed, the Union Society OF VERMONT AND NEW-HAMPSHIRE, AUXILIARY TO THE BAPTIST BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS met, and proceeded to the election of a Board for the year ensuing, viz. Rev. JEREMIAH HIGBEE, President.

The Elders and Messengers of the Wosdstock Association, to the churches they represent, send christian salutation.

Beloved Brethren,

The return of our anniversary meeting affords us an opportunity of addressing you by another circular epistle, in which your attention is solicited to a few particulars of that religion, which consists in an inward and spiritual knowledge of divine truth, faith in, and love to Christ, and to God in Him.

- I. THE AUTHOR. From a consideration of the purity of religion, and the happifying, eternal effects, it produces in the hearts of all those, who are brought to the enjoyment of it, we are confident in ascribing its origin to God. He has revealed it in his word, he applies by his spirit, and will perform it till the day of Jesus Christ.
- II. The being, for whom it is designed, notwithstanding the dignity and excellence of its author, the happiness, the heavenly glory produced by the christian religion; yet it is not designed, for a pure host of angels, but for man, who is sunk into the depth of moral depravity, and by sinning against his God, (were it not for the interposition of divine mercy) would be infinitely miserable. But a being alienated from God in his affections, mortal in his body, but immortal in soul, unworthy of heaven, but a meet subject for hell, is the subject of his creator's compassion and shares in his great salvation. For him Christ came into the world, and suffered the death of crucifixion, that "whosoever believeth on him should not per-

III. This religion commences in the soul, by regeneration and conversion, expressed in scripture, by being born again, born of the spirit of God, and born of God, created in Christ Jesus unto good works. Regeneration and conversion by many are considered as synonimous. They are inseparably connected and imply each other,

yet sufficiently distinct that each may bear a comment.

1. Regeneration is that work of the Holy Spirit, whereby on the account of the surety righteousness of Jesus Christ, his grace is implanted in us, and we are born again, being spiritually changed.— The divine spirit is the sole cause and agent, by whose energy the effect takes place, and as far as this spirit is the cause and agent, the heart is passive in which the effect is wrought. The change of heart produced by the spirit of God is instantaneous. medium between being dead in trespasses and sins, and being sprit. ually alive, it is either a heart of hatred or a heart of love, a child of the devil or a child of God. For saith the scripture, "either make the tree good and its fruit good, or else make the tree corrupt and its fruit corrupt," which represents that there is not an instant of time in which the tree is neither good nor bad. This change is effected in the will or the heart, not in the natural powers of the soul, for it is the will, that is deprayed. The person, who is chosen of God made the subject of grace, is infinitely ill deserving. Therefore the grace of God in regeneration is a sovereign unmerited favor.

2. As regeneration is the work wrought in the heart, by the Holy Spirit, so conversion is the effect of this work, caused to exist by the regenerating influence of God's spirit. The effect, or conversion consists in love. Love is the fulfilling of the law, and is conformity to the law of God, which is all comprehended in these two commandments: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. And thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Therefore the Apostle John says, that "He that loveth is born of God. God is love, and he that dwelleth in love, dwelleth in God, and God in him." The actions of man are virtuous or vicious only as they are connected with, and proceed from the heart. No external compliance, therefore, with the requirements of religion, however strict, will be acceptable to God, if love be wanting in the soul; yet where this love is, it will be

productive of active obedience.

IV. Religion is sentimental and practical. The religious sentiments of a person have great influence on his internal and external walks of live. And as the law of God is to be the criterion by which we are all to be tried for admission into eternal life, or to be sentenced to everlasting punishment; it is of infinite importance that we possess that faith and temper of heart, that God shall approve and be pleased to bless. We are under the greatest obligation to believe the doctrine God has revealed in his word. However contrary to our own feelings or private opinions, if we find it revealed in scripture we are bound to believe in the sovereignty of God, and the divinity of his son; in the depravity of the human, heart, and the immortality of the soul, in the election of grace and the perseverance of the saints, in the everlasting punishment of the finally impenitent and the eternal blessedness of the righteous.

God has abundantly revealed the above important doctrines in his word. It is also contained in the sacred scriptures, "Repent and be baptised every one of you, for the remission of sins." God hath required repentence before baptism, and this previous to the Lord's supper, and since baptism by emersion is the only bible water baptism which is expressed by going down into the water, and "being buried with him by baptism into death," we cannot fellowship the dectrine of those professors, who hold these requirements to be non-essentials. Says Jesus, "If ye love me keep my commandments." The keeping the commandments of Christ is a great evidence of love to him, for he says again, "if any man love me, he will keep my words."

V. The religion of the Bible possesses a superior advantage over all other schemes on earth. The most refined systems of philosophy and morality, of human invention, aim at no higher object than a reformation in manners; and their views are circumscribed by a few revolving suns, but this religion rectifies the heart, and every thing in it bears relation to eternity. The scheme of man aspires only to fit men for this world, but that which is revealed from heaven, while it imparts those dispositions which tend to promote peace and happiness in society, fixes the affection supremely on God.

DEAR BRETHREN,

We congratulate you on the rising empire of our divine Redeemer. We rejoice that men of piety, talents and learning, are frequently coming over from other denominations, into our views of doctrine and practice. Whether it is best so to modify our sentiments, as to meet our erring brethren with their infants in their arms; judge ye for yourselves, we feel satisfied to remain in our old house, and receive all that come in unto us.

We are happy in stating, that the doctrine of the eternal obligation of the Law of God, is better understood and more generally inculcated than it was formerly. It appears to us that this doctrine lays the foundation for all doctrinal, practical, and experimental religion; and that any scheme of religion that denies or overlooks it, is fundamentally erroneous. By this docrine we learn, the nature and consequences of sin; for sin is the transgression of the law, and the consequence is, the penalty—the depravity of the human heart not subject to the law, the nature and necessity of regeneration; the law of God within the heart; the glory of the gospel: for their is as much grace in the gospel, as there is eternal rectitude in the law; the nature of atonement; the end of the law for righteousness; how we aproximate to, or the distance we are from what is our dutyto be, holy as God is holy; the exercise of the new born soul; delight in the law of God after the inner man This is the ax that may be. successfully laid at the root of all self-righteous hopes; for it is written cursed is every one that continueth not in all things that are written in this book of the law to do them. Finally, this doctrine shews the nature of ultimate bliss. To be perfectly conformed to the law of God; and to dwell in society with kindred spirits; is the consummation of happiness.

We solicit a continuance of your correspondence by your letters and messengers. You will learn from our minutes, that some of the churches have been blessed with copious showers of divine grace, while others remain like Gideon's dry fleece. We subscribe our
