WEDNESDAY, JUNE 9, 1813.

1. AT ten o'clock, A. M. brother Otis Robinson, delivered the Introductory Sermon, from Romans XIII. 12. Let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light.

2. Chose brethren Otis Robinson, Moderator,

and Andrew Sherburne, Clerk.

3. After Prayer by the Moderator, appointed brother Abner Flanders, to prepare the Circular Letter; brother William Hooper, who was appointed for that purpose last year, having failed.

4. Chose brethren Simon Lock, Henry Smith and William Goding, a Committee to apportion the money upon the Churches for the expences of the

Affociation the prefent year.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Ministers and Messengers of the New-Hampshire Association, to the several Churches they represent, send Christian Salutation.

DEARLY BELOVED IN THE LORD,

SUFFER us at the close of this solemn and agreeable interview, to send you a few thoughts on that passage of Divine Truth, which is recorded in Romans 15. 13. Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Ghost. Observe, that the scriptures clearly express what God is in himself, and also what he is to his people. In the text above mentioned he is represented as the God of hope.

First. God manifested in the slesh, is the foundation of our hope. The Lord by the mouth of the Prophet says, Behold I lay in Zion for a foundation, a stone, a tried stone, a precious corner stone, a sure foundation. The Apostle says, for other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ.

Secondly. It is God who gives us this hope. He is represented as having given us everlasting consolation, and good hope through grace.

Thirdly. He supports our hope. By the consolations of his Spirit, the truths, promises, and encouragements of his word—by the dispensations of his providence and grace he strengthens us with strength in our souls, and enables us to hope in his mercy. Dearly beloved Brethren! How often should we have given up our hope and sunk in despair, had not God the soundation, giver and supporter of our hope enabled us to trust in him.

We will now confider the bleffings which they

enjoy who possess this hope. These are expressed in the text, and the Apostle prayed that his brethren might be filled with them, viz.

All joy and peace in believing. We cannot suppose that the Apostle intended all kinds of joy and peace. But such as are peculiar to the christian and perfectly consistent with the exercise of true faith in Christ. It is not rejoicing in iniquity, but rejoicing in the truth—They rejoice in God as their God and portion forever—They have joy in the Holy Ghost—They have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ: This peace is like a river which increases until they launch into the ocean of eternal peace.

There we shall bathe our weary souls
In seas of heavenly rest;
And not a wave of trouble roll
Across our peaceful breasts.

Dearly beloved, let us be exhorted to examine curselves whether we be in the faith.

Do we possess that hope which is discribed and recommended in the holy Scriptures? Do we rejoice in hope of the glory of God? And while we hear of wars, and garments rolled in blood—distress of nations, and cessolating judgments—do we rejoice in God and joy in the God of our falvation?

Dear brethren, what greater blessings can we wish than to be filled with all joy and peace, and to abound in hope through the power of the holy Ghost?

Our meeting has been folemn, harmonious and refreshing. Finally brethren farewell; Trust in the Lord for in the Lord Jehovah is everlasting strength.
