WEDNESDAY, JUNE 8, 1814.

Voted to recommend the fourth day of July for religious purposes. Voted that brethren Hooper, Wm. Chadbourn and Remick be a committee to visit and enquire into the state of the Church of Newmarkett and report at our next meeting.

Voted to recommend to the Churches to abstain from presenting or introducing any matter of Church labor into the Association; as it is not the province of the Association to interfere with the independence, discipline or government of Churches.

Voted to hold our next meeting at brother Delano's meeting house in Lebanon, on the second Wednesday of June next at ten o'clock A. M.

At 12 o'clock the business being finished, brother William Allen preached to a very full assembly, from I. Cor. 3, 9.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Elders and Messengers of the New-Hampshire Baptist Association to the Churches they represent, send christian salutation.

BELOVED IN CHRIST JESUS.

WE have once more had the pleafing opportunity of meeting and renewing our correspondence and experiencing how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity; and are ready to say that it is like the precious Ointment poured on Aaron's head that run to the skirts of his garments, or as the dew of Hermon, and as the dew that descended upon the mountains of Zion. The season has been refreshing to many, and the pleasing intelligence from the churches and sister associations by their Messengers and letters have been to us as cold water to a thirsty soul. To perpetuate such joys as these, our correspond-

ence should be continued, that our sellowship may increase; we should dwell in love, that we might dwell in God—Therefore let brotherly love continue.

The day in which we live is a day of darkness and trouble, and our political divisions have greatly marred our happiness, and the enemy of our fouls has taken an advantage of us; his object is to break our union and prevent our fellowship with Brethren, thefe things ought not so each other.
