11. Appointed Brother Lock, to write the Circular Letter, and

Brother Goding, the Corresponding Letter, for next year.

12. Chose brother Henry Smith, Treasurer.

13. Voted to hold our next Association in Wells, 1st Parish, on the second Wednesday in June next, at 10 o'clock A. M.

14. Appointed brother Sixon Lock, to preach the Introductory

sermon, and in case of failure, brother Cook.

15. Voted that the Minutes of this Association be deposited with the Treasurer for distribution.

16. Adjourned until 2 o'clcck P. M.

Annual Session; and report at our next Association.

21. Chose brother Timothy Hodsbon, Secretary, to correspond

with the Baptist Board of Missions.

22. Voted that the thanks of this Association be tendered to the worthy citizens of this town, for their judicious arrangements, hospitality and promptness to accommodate and entertain us in our present session.

At 3 o'clock, the husiness of the Association being finished, the Moderator addressed the Assembly in a very interesting and solemn manner, and concluded by imploring the Divine Benediction on them.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Elders and Messengers of the New-Hampshire Association, to the Churches whom they represent.

DEAR BRETHREN,

WE still consider it a duty to continue our former practice in addressing you in a short epistle. Many have been the subjects, to which your attention has been called; and perhaps, none can be found of more consequence, or of more utility than that, on which you were addressed in our last circular, (viz.) Covetousness;—which we hope you have, and will improve to the best advantage. We now ask your attention to a few remarks on Benevolence. brethren, if covetousness is inconsistent with the Christian character, and produceth such baleful consequences as the Lord hath stated in his blessed word—ought we not to consider it as the most detestable and destructive thing that ever was found in the camp of Israel? Certainly those, who are found under the governing influence of it, must be the greatest sufferers; and whatever may be our pretences to a benign principle, we may be assured, that our real character cannot be concealed; for "The tree is known by its Beloved brethren, if we are Chrishaus, we have known by happy experience the blessed effects of genuine benevolence, which has been the brightest ornament of the Church of Christ, in every age. The very foundation of the Church, and the believer's hope, is but the effect of Divine Benevolence. Our great Benefactor has given us so many precepts and examples to designate a benevolent mind, that we cannot remain ignorant of the true Christian charac-If the Lord has delivered us from the bondage of sin, we ought to stand fast in that liberty, wherewith Christ has made us free. If our glorious Redeemer hath given his life a ransom for us, shall we refuse to lay down our lives for the brothren, or withhold any thing that duty calls for, to promote the true interest of His Kingdom in the world?

Ever remember, that "the Lord loveth a cheerful giver." and has raid, "it is more blessed to give, than to receive." Let us endeavor to reduce to practice every Divine injunction, that we may prove to ourselves, and the world, that we are what we profess to be. may expect many foes to encounter while in this militant state; and what encouragement can we have, that we shall obtain the victory, unless we have on the whole Gospel armor?—remember, that our enemy is continually watching to take the advantage of us; and doubtless, will appear in different forms and will accede to any thing consistent with himself, if thereby, he may gain an ascendency over But it is important that we receive the exhortation, "watch, and pray, that you enter not into temptation." Neglect not the duties of the closet, nor those of a more social an I public nature. May the Lord make you faithful in every good word and work; "working in you that, which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ. To whom be glory, forever!" Amen!

CORRESPONDING LETTER.

DEAR BRETHREN,

When we reflect on the manifestation of God's love in accomplishing his ancient purpose of man's redemption, we are constrained to say with the Apostle, "without controlersy, great is the mystery of Godliness." In this glorious plan, the holy Prophets rejoiced; when the promise was revealed unto them, they confided in the veracity of an immutable God. While they believed, indeed, the word spoken by Angels was steadfast; they were fully pursuaded concerning the truth of the promise, confirmed before of God, in Christ. We regret, that we have not the happiness of receiving messengers, and minutes, from a number of our Sister Associations. We, however, duly appreciate those which we have

received.

We have ever prised your correspondence, and shall always be ready to reciprocate your communications; and still solicit a continuance thereof.

With the liveliest satisfaction this Resolution is offered for your affectionate acceptance. The Report of the Convention and Board, now in the press, will be forwarded as early as practicable. Your zeal and piety will provide the earliest and most efficient channels for its circulation.

Among the articles which the Report will more particularly exhibit, you will be gratified to learn, that the meeting of the Convention has been distinguished by an uninterrupted and exalted harmony, by the spirit of iervent prayer, and jealousy for the Lord of Hosts.

Our sister White, who accompanied brother Hough and family to India, is married to Rev. Mr. Rowe of the Serampore mission, and is settled at Digah, nearly 400 miles up the river Ganges, where she superintends a growing and important female seminary. Brother Hough and family have arrived at Rangoon, to the joy of brotherand sister Judson. Two additional young missionaries from New-England, have been appointed to go out and join them. Ranaldson has been chosen a missionary to officiate in New-Orleans and its vicinity, and brethren Peck and Welch to commence a Western mission, to be extended as Providence shall direct, to the Indian tribes. Its commencement will be at or near St. Louis, on the western banks of the Mississippi. Brother Rice has requested the sentiment of the Convention as to the propriety of his sailing immediately for India. The opinion was unanimous and decided, that, owing to the high importance of his services, he ought to remain longer in the United States. Should he visit you, you will, I am convinced, receive him as a brother beloved for the Saviour's sake.
